CHESTERTOWN JAIL INSPECTED

Mr. Stutsman, Secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Society, Makes Report.

Mr. J. O. Stutsman, general secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Society, who recently inspected the Kent County Jail at Chestertown, makes the following report:

"The exterior of the Chestertown Jail is not unlike that of a large brick mansion. The surrounding grounds are clean and shady. It occupies one of the rear corners of the Courthouse Square. There is no outer wall of any character except a board fence, which is more for appearance than for service. Approach to the jail is accessible from any direction. It would be exceedingly easy for a confederate to pass any weapon or tool up to the prisoner through a rear window. It would be impossible to conduct an execution anywhere about this institution and keep out the crowds."

"The residence portion, which is occupied by the Sheriff, comprises the larger part of the building. On the first floor are three large rooms devoted to office and sitting room, dining room and kitchen. The kitchen is used to prepare food for the prisoners, as well as for the deputies and family of the Sheriff. The front portion of the second story is divided into large bedrooms for the Sheriff's family, and the entire third floor is composed of bedrooms for the deputies, also storerooms used by county officers."

"One very noticeable feature of the jail is the proximity of the jail to the actual living quarters of the Sheriff. It is not possible to get a prisoner up to the second tier without taking him through the living quarters. The corridor in which the worst criminals are congregated is within constant sight of the Sheriff's dining room and chief hallway of the Sheriff's residence."

"There are two distinct sections of cells in the prison proper—one on the first floor and one on the second. A corridor 8 by 50 feet is the approach to the four cells on the first floor. This corridor is well ventilated and sufficient light is thrown, but the entire section has but one electric light for night. This section is the weak point in the jail. A single-barred door is all that prevents escape. The prisoners are allowed free use of this corridor in daytime, and with concerted action all could escape. I regard such an arrangement as exceedingly dangerous to the life of the jailer."

"The cells in this section are about 8 by 10 feet and are lighted through the floor which leads from the corridor. There is a hollow, ringing echo in them which makes their occupancy doubly disagreeable. The doors are of unchained bars. The only commode or running water on the section is in one of these cells, which is in use by all. Buckets are used when the men are confined in the cells at night."

"The upper section is composed of four large cells and a bathroom. This bathroom is equipped with a fair bathtub and a commode for general use. The cells are much larger and lighter than those of the other section. Each is about 10 by 14 feet in dimensions, and is lighted by windows about 24 by 5 feet. The windows are double-paned and secure, except that they are easy of communication from the yard at the rear of the jail. Two of these cells are securely lined with sheet steel. Two are of ordinary brick walls, which have been recently whitewashed. The floors of the latter, as well as those on the first section, are of concrete, and the first section of the steel-lined ones are of three-ply wood."

"There does not seem to be much system about the classification of prisoners. All in the time I was in this section a colored female prisoner was sitting on the floor of the corridor in front of the door leading into one of the large cells playing cards with three colored men who were confined in one cell."

"The beds are of iron, with mattresses and double blankets. They are as clean as could be expected."

"The dietary consists of three meals daily as follows: Breakfast, light bread, molasses and coffee; dinner, light bread, pork, one vegetable, sometimes two, and water; supper, light bread, coffee and molasses. The county allows 35 cents per diem for each prisoner. Clothing is furnished to discharged men serving as long as 30 days when it is needed."

"There are at present 13 prisoners in the institution. Four are violently insane, who are held here for want of a better institution. Six are awaiting trial for the October term. Three are sentenced prisoners. Ten are males and three are females. All of them are colored."

"No religious services are held at any time for the prisoners in this jail. I conferred with representatives of the Women's Christian Temperance Union who have formerly been interested in this work, and received the promise that steps should be taken to organize a county committee."

"The Sheriff, Mr. Daniel W. Hadaway, and his deputies, Mr. Lockerman and Mr. S. E. T. Startt, showed great interest in my investigation and gave me every personal attention."
