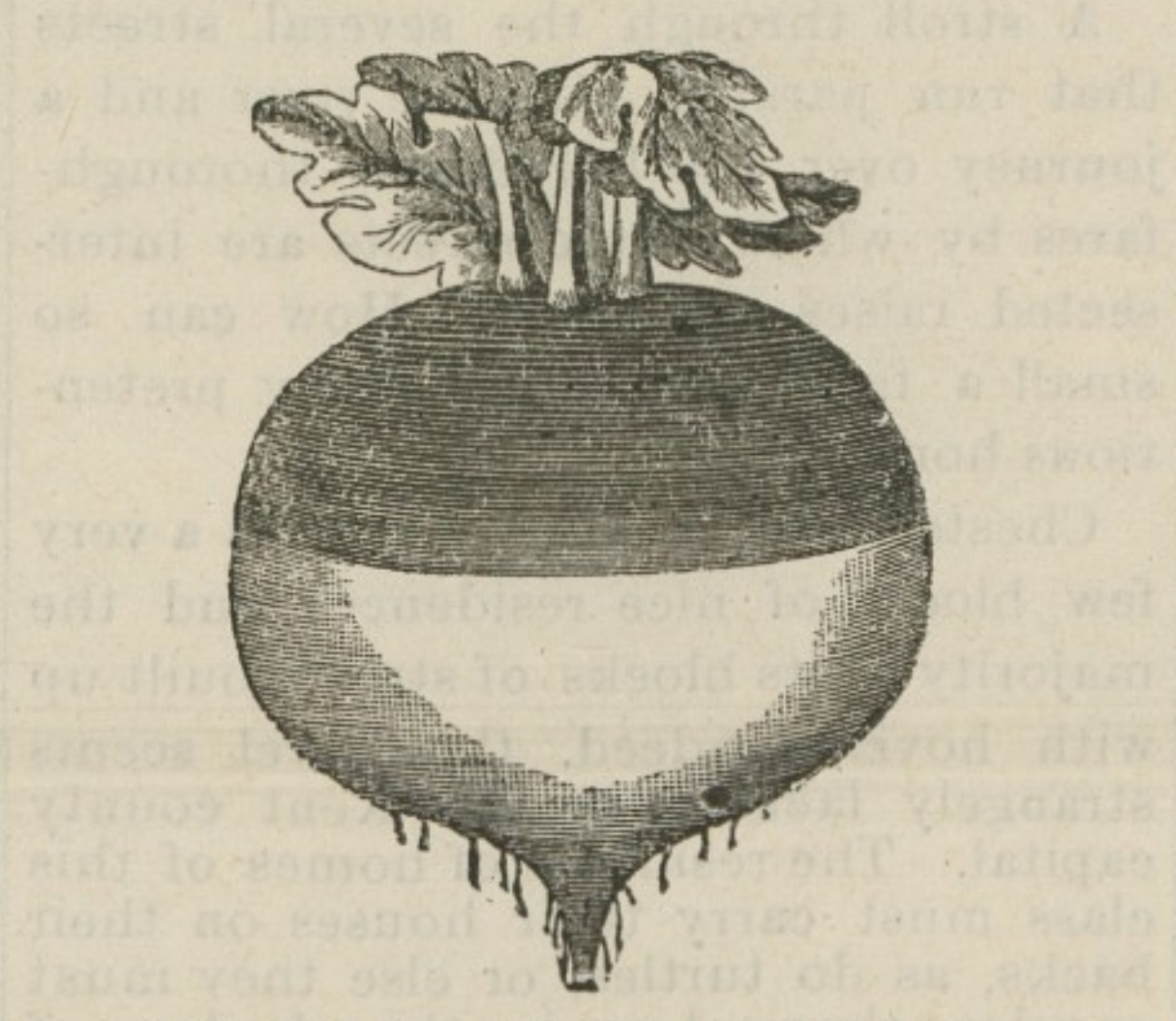

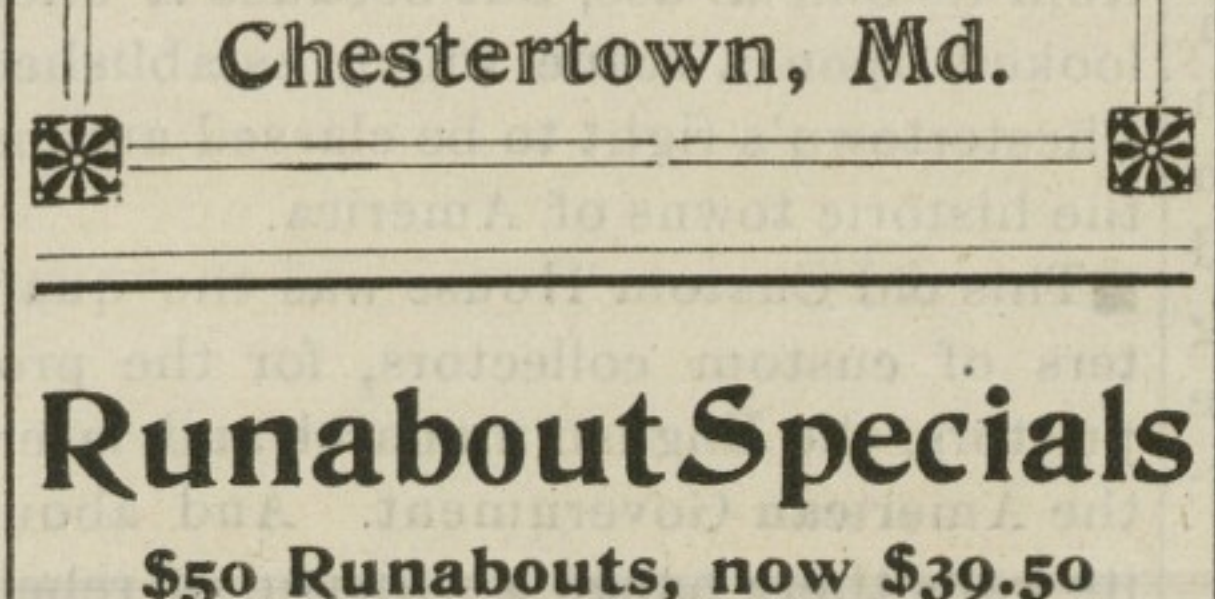

Live Local Notes.

New Dwelling—Mrs. Wm. S. Godwin has contracted with Mr. Asarali M. Kendall for the erection of a new dwelling on the site of her burned building at Hill Top. Mr. Kendall will begin work at once and expects to complete same before Christmas. It will be three stories and arranged for the accommodation of boarders.

Won the Prize—Robert Simpers, son of Mr. E. W. F. Simpers, formerly of Chestertown, but now of Philadelphia, visited his aunts, the Miss Wilkins, the past week. He was warmly congratulated upon having won the capital prize of \$500 in a contest for best Arbuckle's coffee advertisement. Robert was a contestant with 4,000 others and came out ahead!

Lightning—Three stacks of wheat on Mr. Eugene Manly's farm at Goose Hill were struck by lightning Wednesday afternoon and completely destroyed by fire. They were insured for \$500 in E. P. Beck's agency. A shed on Mrs. Massey's farm across the road was also set on fire but the flames were soon under control.

A horse was killed on W. E. Jarrell's farm, near town, tenanted by Mr. Walbert.

Preacher's Loss—Rev. W. L. White, pastor of the Chestertown M. E. Church, found six of his fine pullets dead in the coop one day last week and upon investigation found a hole in the neck of each one. He procured more chickens and on Sunday morning found most of them dead. It is supposed that a weasel or mink paid his respects to the parson's coop and liked it so well that he returned a second time.

New Starters—Col. Geo. E. Noland, has arranged to have Starter Walter N. Hare, of Wilmington, Del., to do the starting at Tolchester August 26 to 27. Hare, it is said, will also officiate as starter of the races at Idlewild Park, Easton, Md. Negotiations are pending between Mr. Noland and C. E. Burrows of Baltimore, with a view to having Mr. Burress act as presiding judge at the Tolchester meeting.

Big Personality Sales.—The sales of personal property the past week have been very successful.
