

REGULATIONS FOR GASOLINE BOATS

FUL EXERCISE

New Act of Congress to be Rigidly Enforced in Future.

REVENUE CUTTER PROVIDED.

Gasoline Boats Must Carry Life Preservers—Must Display Two White Lights at Night—Must Also Have Bell, Whistle and Fog Horn—Heavy Penalties Provided.

Hon. A. Lincoln Dryden, Collector of the Port of Crisfield, was in Salisbury last Thursday, looking after matters in connection with the recent order of the Treasury Department relative to the operation of gasoline boats. Mr. Dryden had just returned from Washington with strict instructions to enforce the law, without fear or favor, against owners of gasoline boats which ply in these waters without proper lights and other safety appliances.

The new regulations are very stringent. All sizes of gasoline boats, no matter what their use, must be equipped at once with a whistle, bell and fog horn. No specific style or size is prescribed for boats under 15 tons register, except that these appliances must be capable of answering the purpose of the act of Congress. The horn and whistle must be sufficient so that the sound can be heard a proper distance. A hand bell may be used if large enough.

All gasoline boats plying these waters after sunset, or before sunrise, must carry a white light at the bow and a white light at the stern, the latter light to be elevated so as to make a range. Each boat must also have a red and a green light, so that these can be displayed in case of emergency.

In addition to all the above equipment, if passengers are carried for hire, a life preserver must be provided for each person, so carried, and there must be at least one licensed man on each boat.

The penalties for violation of these provisions range from \$200 to \$500 fine on the boat and \$50 fine on the master or mate. The law is now in force, and Collector Dryden has been provided with a revenue cutter to traverse these waters and see that the law is complied with. The cutter is likely to appear at any time and would advise owners of gasoline boats to meet the requirements of the law.
