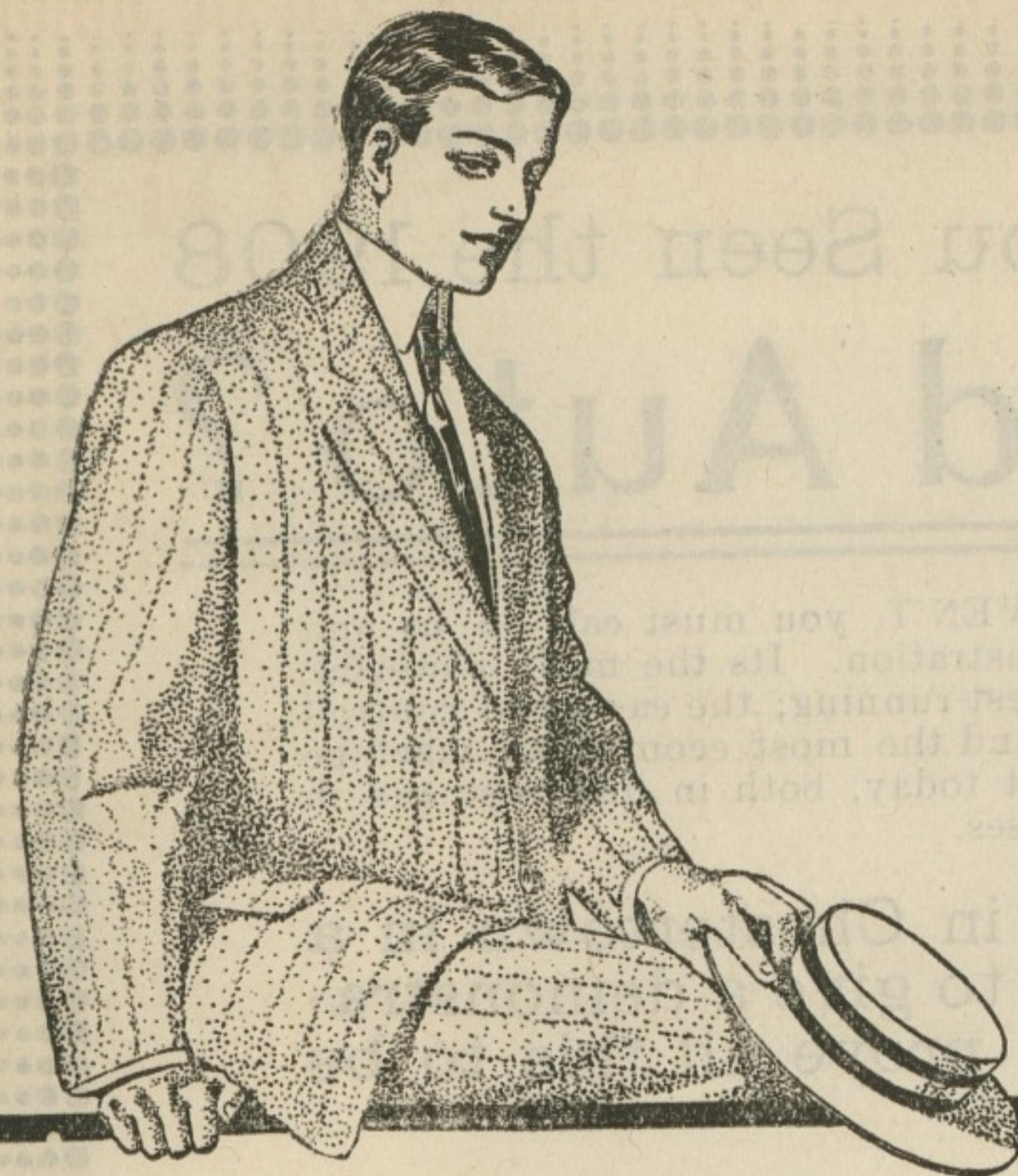

Real Estate Sale.—Col. Samuel L. Wright has purchased the Willard Melvin home near Washington College for \$4800. Mr. Wright will remove to his new home the first of January 1909. A. J. Smith, a well-known ice cream dealer of Baltimore, has purchased Edward B. Emory's stock farm, near Rock Hall, for \$8,000. Mr. Smith will remove to his new property shortly. Contract Awarded.—The Board of County Commissioners of Queen Anne's Tuesday awarded the contract for the building of the new jail and sheriff's residence to Pritchard and Furniss, of Pocomoke, for \$18,275. The contract for the steel cells to be placed in the new building was awarded to the Pauly Jail-building Company, of New York, for \$2,275. The present jail was erected about 50 years ago, and for a number of years has been in an unsafe condition for the keeping of prisoners. Several have escaped from the institution during the past 12 or 15 years. Messrs. Pritchard and Furniss built the Queen Anne National Bank in this town.

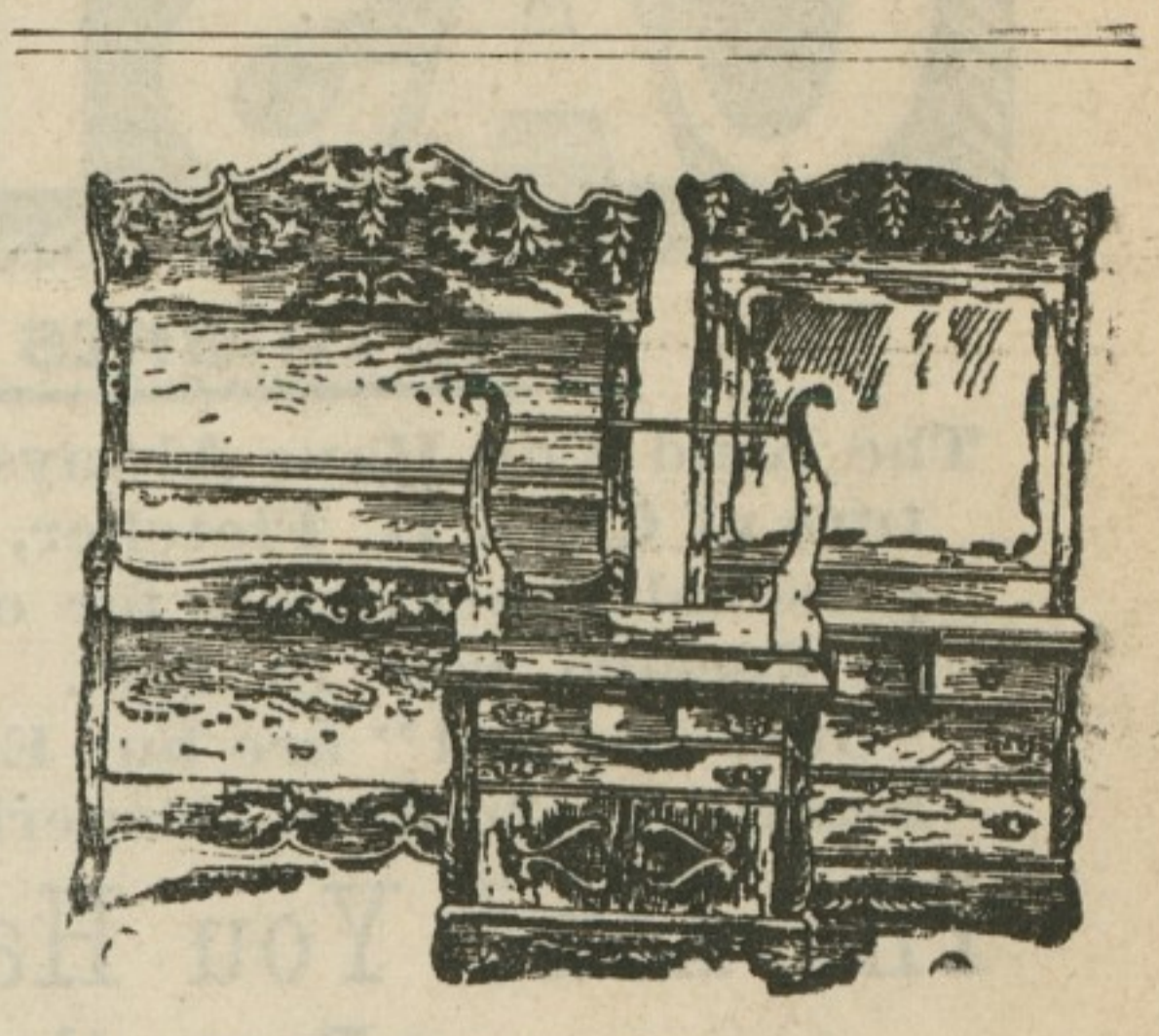
