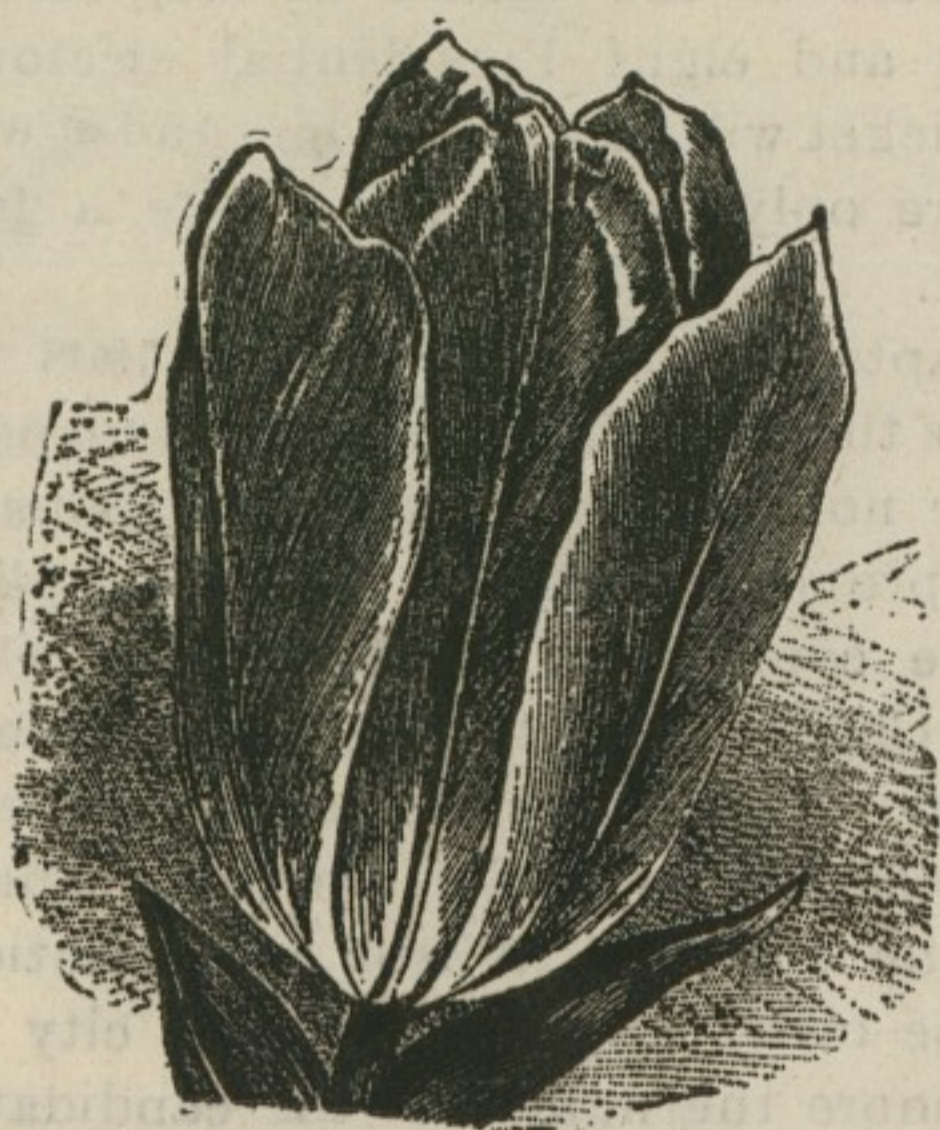

COURT IN SESSION.

The October term of the Circuit Court for Kent county was convened on Monday last 10 o'clock a. m. with chief Judge James A. Pearce on the Bench, and the full complement of Court officers in their respective positions.

At the opening of Court juror Chas. P. Norris was excused from service and R. Wesley Moffett drawn in his stead.

Judge Pearce designated Mr. Chas. H. Price as foreman of the Grand Jury. The composition of this body being completed as follows:

Grand Jurors—Charles H. Price, foreman; R. B. Wilson, George L. Bowers, John Brice, Perry B. Rasin, George W. Jones, Edgar J. Watson, A. P. Emerson, W. D. Pennington, H. S. DeFord, John C. Wood, Charles C. Strong, Richard W. Comegys, Wm. G. Smyth, C. Romane Skirven, Fernal Jump, George E. Nolan, Richard C. Leverton, Isaac Gibbs, James A. Russell, Jeff. D. Bacchus, Lewis P. Atwell and Lewis C. Ayres.

The remainder of the fall panel comprise the petit jury, and is as follows:

Petit Jury—Benj. F. Davis, Jesse R. Copper, Geo. D. Lofland; George B. Westcott, Elmer E. Leary, G. Allan Jarman, James T. Crew, Wm. G. Rasin, Edward Wilkins, Arthur M. Brown, Thomas S. Bardsley, Joel R. Clements, James W. Stevens, A. Carroll Wilson, R. Wesley Moffett, Theodore Dempsey, Harry P. Jones, Wm. J. Heppron, W. B. Secone, James W. Chapman, Joseph B. Hoesinger, Benj. I. Taylor, George S. Biddle, Walter B. Strong, Benj. T. Ashley and Peter Brinsfield.

The several court dockets were called cases marked for trial or otherwise disposed of.

The first case called for trial was that of Sarah E. Simpson vs. D. D. Osborne & Co., an appeal from the docket of Justice R. W. Calder. Jury trial.

The Grand Jury brought in the following presentment: Against Jacob Martin for murder, and same for assault with intent to kill; Walter Bradshaw for carrying concealed weapons; Walter Boyer for assault with intent to kill.

In the case against the Osborne Harvesting Co., the jury returned a verdict of one cent for plaintiff.

A. L. Hudson vs. Brown Manufacturing Co., jury trial; verdict for appellee for \$33.50.

State of Md. vs. Joseph Thomson, colored, charged with firing at two colored boys near Melittota; jury trial, verdict guilty, judgment suspended. H. W. Vickers, Jr., for prisoner, W. W. Beck for State.

The appeal case of Mrs. Emma N. Hessey vs. Aaron Taylor was tried before court. Judgment reversed and judgment given for appellee for \$12.50 with costs. H. H. Barroll for Mrs. Hessey, H. E. Perkins for Taylor.

The case of Aaron C. Jones of Ekton vs. P. B. & W. R. R. Co., occupied the court several days. This was a suit for damages for alleged false arrest. Messrs. W. S. Evans, Omar D. Crothers and H. H. Barroll for plaintiff; Marion deK. Smith for defendant. The case was on trial at time of going to press.

The Grand Jury was discharged finally at 3 P. M. yesterday.

Dentler Graves, of Frittsburg, representing the great Heintz "57 varieties" pickling establishment, which is known all over the world, was in Chestertown this week seeking a location for a branch house on the Eastern Shore. These branch houses are immense affairs and engage in growing large acres of tomatoes, corn, vegetables, etc. The representative called upon J. D. Urie, Esq., and discussed the matter. He left here yesterday. Mr. Urie says Mr. Graves seemed much pleased with Chestertown and the surrounding neighborhood and he has strong hopes of hearing favorably from him soon, and that we may get one of these branches located here.

Merited Promotions.—Mr. William D. Maslin, who for the past three years has been an agent under Mr. George French, assistant superintendent of the Prudential Insurance Company at Chestertown, has been promoted to the position of Assistant Superintendent of the big Prudential with headquarters at Middletown, Del. He assumes his new position on Monday next.

Mr. L. J. Hayes, another Kent county boy, after spending a successful two years in Dover, under Superintendent F. V. Simpers of the Prudential, has been promoted as traveling assistant in the same company. These are both merited promotions and we congratulate both the gentlemen and the Prudential.
