The Court very much to the surprise of the public acquitted Grinnell and he was let go free. Brookins was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary.

"Major" Robinson, of Morgne, was tried before the Court for violating the local option law in selling Joseph Coston intoxicants. Verdict, guilty, and sentenced to twelve months in House of Correction or pay \$100.

Robert Taylor was tried and acquitted on charge of selling intoxicants, S. S. Beck represented defendant; W. W. Beck State.

George Ottaway plead guilty of violating the local option law in two cases and was sentenced to 10 months in House of Correction or pay fine of \$100; same in Lizzie Chaney and Wm. H. Johnson's cases.

Spencer Morris was acquitted of selling liquor as was Geo. B. Carmichael.
