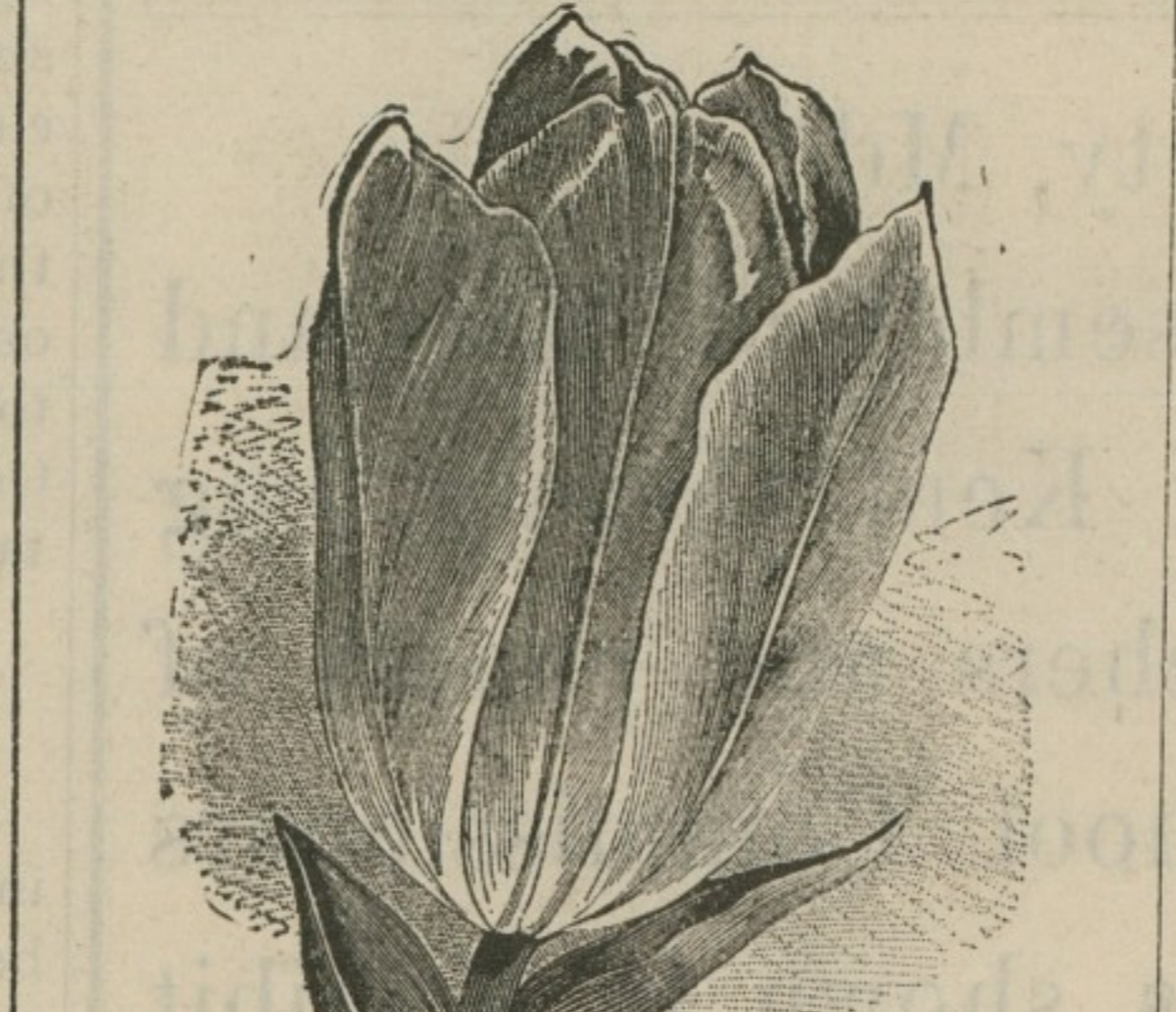

Strawboard Co.'s Affairs.—The creditors
of the American Strawboard Co. have
been addressed a letter in which the first
indication of a settlement of its affairs is
noted. The letter reads in part thus:

Chicago, December 30th, 1908.
To the Creditors of American Straw Board Co.
The reorganization committee of the United
Box Board & Paper Co., which owns about 75
percent of the stock of the American Straw
Board Co., has about completed its plans of reorganiza-
tion and is prepared at an early date to take
the United Box Board and Paper Co. out of the
hands of receivers. Preparatory to doing this it
is deemed essential that the American Straw
Board Co. be taken out of the hands of receivers
and its property restored to the company under
the management of its officers and directors.

The general business conditions throughout
the country have very materially improved
since the company was placed in the hands of a
receiver and it is now thought that the receiver-
ship should be terminated, which will of
course greatly reduce the expense of operating
the company.

The committee feels that the company will
be able to pay all its creditors within ninety
days, and with this in view we are enclosing
you herewith a consent to the discharge of the
receivers and the dismissal of the proceedings
in the United States Court. The company's
assets are largely in excess of its liabilities
and will be able to take care of its obligations
in the proper course of business. In our opinion
unnecessary, and is not to the best interest of
the creditors.
