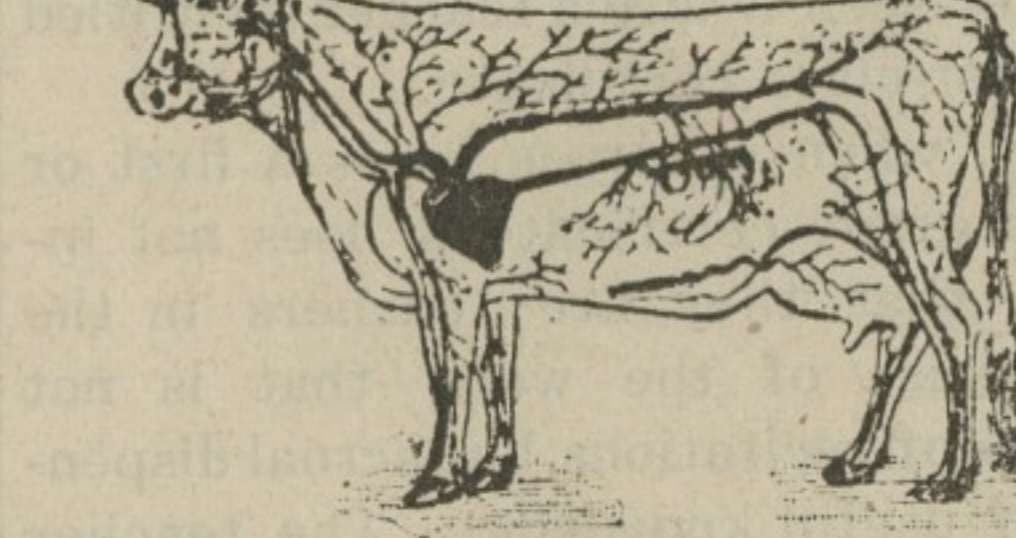

GAS PLANT FOR CHESTERTOWN.

The Town Commissioners, of Chestertown, have entered into an agreement with W. W. Hess, Esq., of Philadelphia, for the installation of a gas plant here. The legal papers have been drawn and a forfeit of \$500 required in case the plant is not installed. Mr. Hess stated to the News man that he hoped to begin work by the first of April and to have same ready for use within eighteen months. Mr. Hess installed plants in Salisbury, Havre de Grace and other places and does not ask a cent from our people. He estimates that it will require about \$25,000 to put a plant here. The gas will be used principally for cooking purposes.

SAVINGS BANK ELECTS PRESIDENT

Mr. Milbourn A. Toulson, The Well Known Druggist, Elected to Fill Vacancy Caused by Death of Mr. John K. Aldridge.

At a well-attended meeting of the directors of the Kent County Savings Bank Wednesday Mr. Milbourn A. Toulson was unanimously elected President to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. John K. Aldridge, and Mr. Fred. G. Usilton was unanimously elected Vice-President.

Mr. Toulson is too well known to require any introduction from us. Born in Worton in 1854, graduated in pharmacy in 1876, he began business in Chestertown in 1878 since which time by patience, industry and honesty he has built up a lucrative and extensive business and no man stands higher in this community. He is a man of kind heart and high character and will give to the bank all the attention which the position requires. He was one of the organizers of the institution and has been vice-president for 15 years. He is succeeded as vice-president by Fred. G. Usilton, senior editor of the KENT NEWS.

Last week the usual semi-annual dividend of 4 per cent was declared, and besides having a surplus of \$50,000 equal to its capital, has a fund of \$11,000 in undivided profits.
