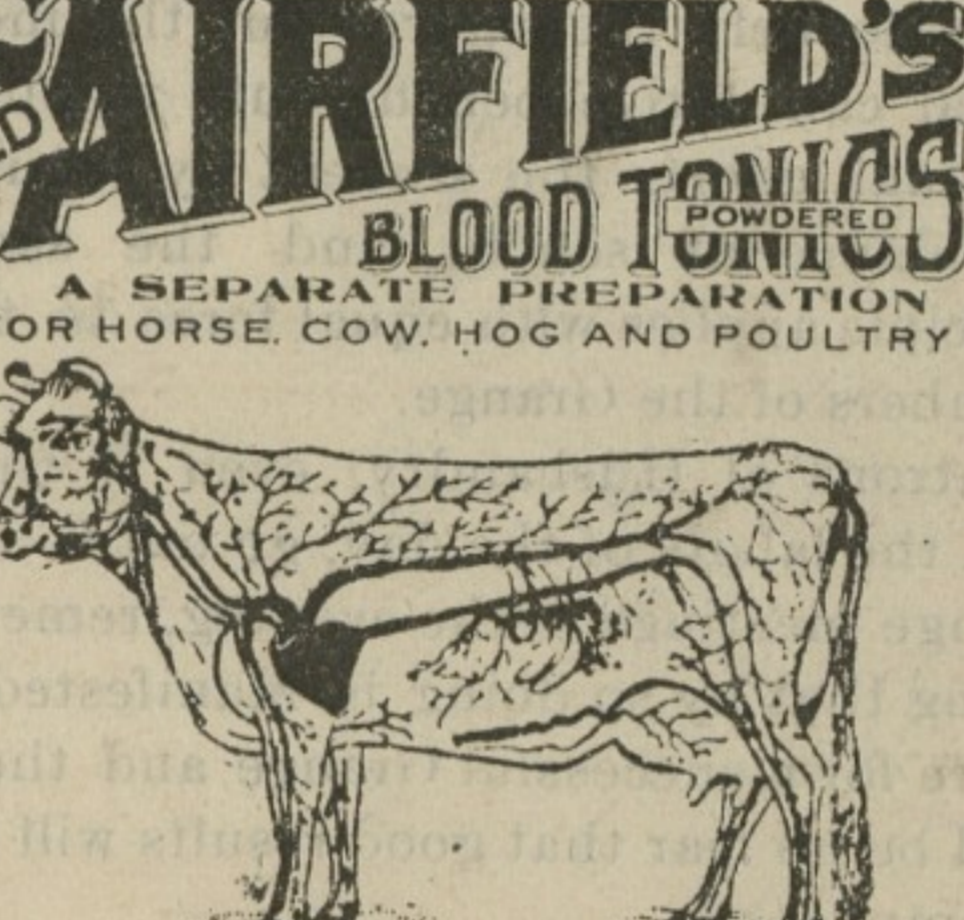

BETTER PROSPECT FOR WATER.

Our town water board are encouraged at this writing to hope for good results from the work at the new artesian well. The report in our last issue of the discouraging prospect was entirely correct, but the spirit of the Water Board to continue in the effort to overcome what seemed an insurmountable obstacle has proven to have been the right thing. The contractor has succeeded in getting through the rock and unexpectedly found a splendid vein of sand over twenty feet thick, which it is thought will prove the bed of a plentiful supply of pure water. In a day or two the success or failure of the well will be fully determined. The bore now is 1130 feet deep.

Accidents.—Mr. Wm. Bonwell, near Kennedyville, was accidentally kicked in the head by one of his horses last Sunday morning and severely hurt. Dr. H. G. Simpers rendered surgical aid and Mr. Bonwell is now improving.

Shocks Mistaken for Earthquakes.—Wednesday morning about 7:30 o'clock two distinct shocks in quick succession shook the houses of Chestertown, causing windows and dishes to fairly rattle. Everybody thought of earthquakes, but the shocks were due to explosions of dynamite plant of the duPont Powder Company at Gibbstown, N. J. The explosion occurred in one of the mixing rooms, and wrecked seven buildings. Thirteen workmen were injured, one of them fatally.

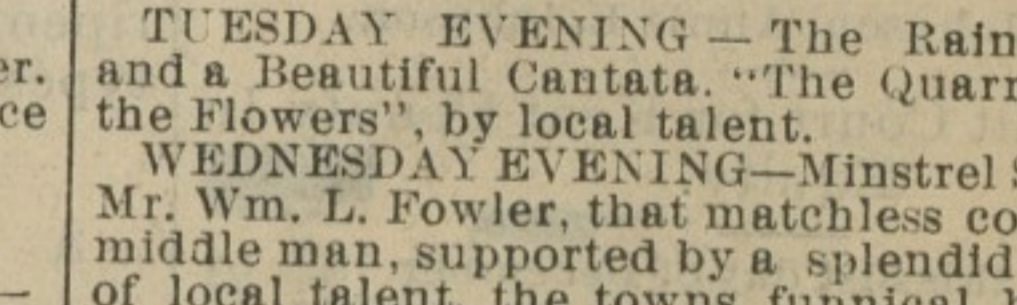
