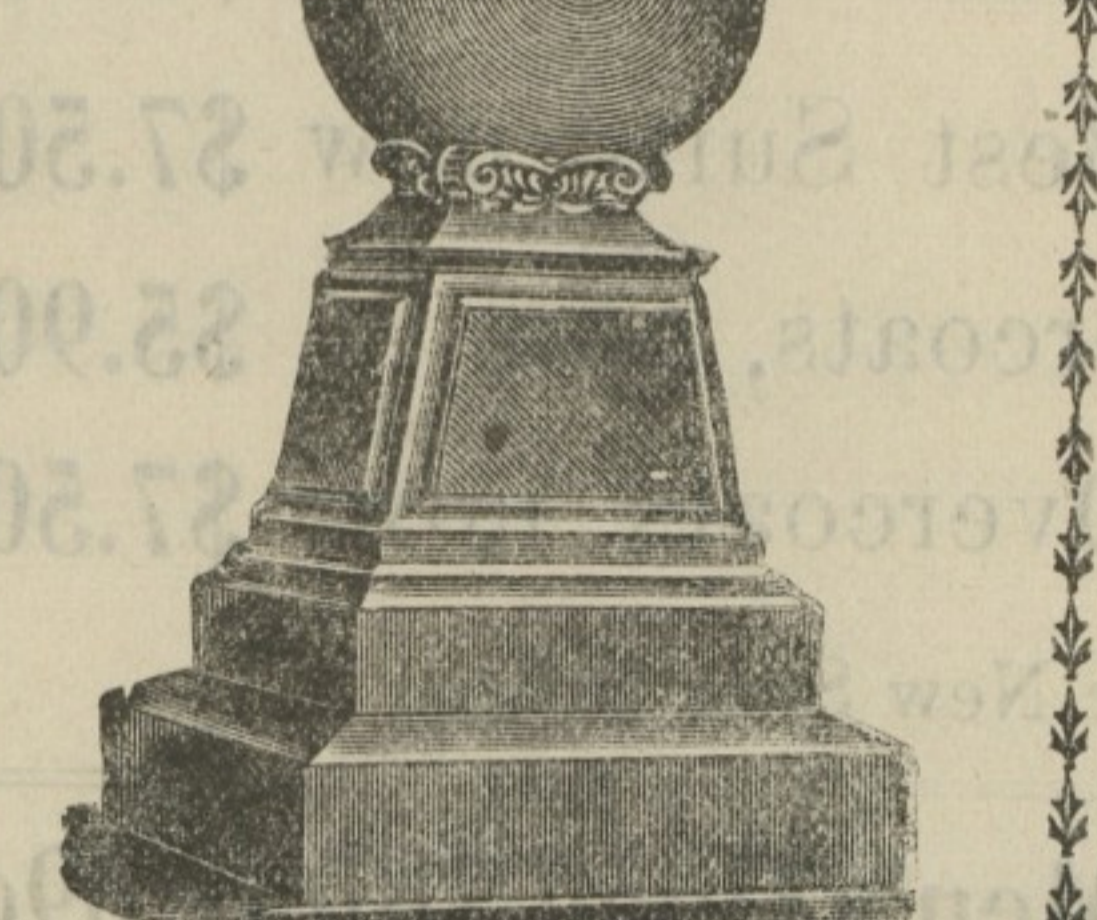

HICKS FOR FEBRUARY.

"A regular storm period will cover the first five days of February," says Rev. Irl R. Hicks, the long range weather prophet. This disturbance will begin with falling barometer and rising thermometer in the West, but the rain, wind and snow will not get organized for business until the third. From that to the sixth, look out! Mr. Hicks prognosticates that it will clear off cold, which is not unusual with a winter storm. The cold, clear weather will last about three days when a reactionary storm period will set in, being central from the eighth to the tenth. It will get much warmer, but the cold weather will follow so closely on the heels of the storm that the rear guard of the rain will be turned to snow. It may be remarked that Mr. Hicks' storms almost invariably move from west to east, but the rain, wind and snow will take but little account of the gulf storms or those which sweep in upon the Atlantic coast from the sea. Mr. Hicks drops this word of advice to amateur prophets or disciples: "Learn well his lesson of storm and anti-storm areas passing periodically across the country, from west to east, and you will rarely 'get left' in your calculations of what will reach your locality at regular intervals."

By the middle of the month, Mr. Hicks thinks, the vernal equinox should be having some influence, and this will affect a storm period running from the thirteenth to the fifteenth. Storms of rain turning to snow, will pass in the usual direction, although the stars indicate that this storm may run over its schedule and mingle with the next period. The reactionary storm period is central from the twentieth to the twenty-second. At this time Mercury will be making a disturbance and the inconstant moon will be in perigee and on the equator, so there will be a high tide time. It will get warm, producing thunder storms, which will turn to sleet in northern sections. Blizzards are entirely possible as a wind-up. High gales and cold weather will push the rear of this storm, and right here Mr. Hicks does give the South a little recognition by saying that hurricanes in the West Indies may affect the Gulf and South coast regions. Another four days of the month, being especially strong on sleet. "This is a time when the sleet god will have a picnic with the wires," says Mr. Hicks; "watch and see." This will be a disagreeable and dangerous time, according to the prophet, and ice gorges, floods and other manifestations will keep mankind on the anxious bench.
