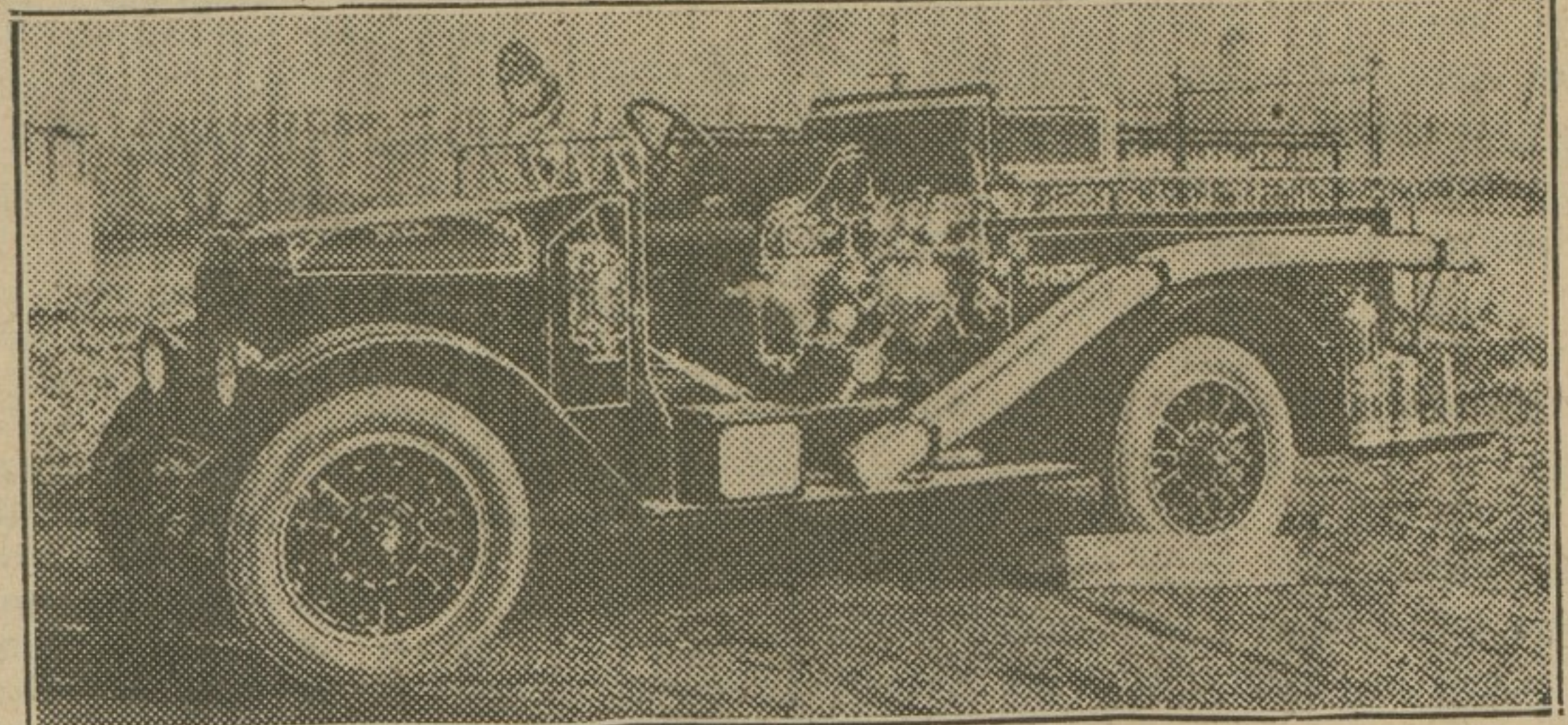

Fire Engine Greater Power Than Makers Guaranteed The new fire apparatus purchased for Chestertown greatly pleases all who have examined it and our citizens generally. It's maker is the United States Fire Apparatus Co., of Wilmington. The cost of truck, International, bought thru Jones and Satterfield was \$1,177.25. The cost of the apparatus was \$2,790 less 2 per cent off for cash was \$2,734.20. Total cost was \$3,911.45. The committee advanced enough so as to pay cash and get the discount. There is sufficient money subscribed to pay all of it. We therefore urge those who have not paid to do so at once. The hose body will carry 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch double jacket fire department hose. The sides are 12 inch gauge picketed sheet steel slatted, with sills of angle iron. The top of the body reinforced with angle iron to give the proper finish. The flooring is hard wood and removal. Railings are 1 1/2 inch solid brass pipe and extend full length of body and down to top of rear seat. Seat is of sheet steel, upholstered with spring cushion. The pump is Northern Rotary Fire pump, capacity guaranteed of 12 gallons per rated horse power. Special cooling system to cool motor when pumping. Two sections of suction hose, strainer, booster connection on tank pump and by-pass to operate independently of one another. Side running boards, fenders and equipped with fire extinguishers, ladders, pick, axe, crow bar, search light, bell, chemical shut-off nozzle with two tips, tool box, soda canisters, bags and acid rechargers. 200 feet of 3/4 inch four ply chemical hose in fifty foot section and chemical equipment of 35 gallon tank, Holloway type, automatic hose reel, electrical equipment. The general finish is all polished and copper material, plated and nickel plated and first-class workmanship. The engine developed as much as 70 pound pressure at the nozzle and delivered 315 gallons of water per minute.
