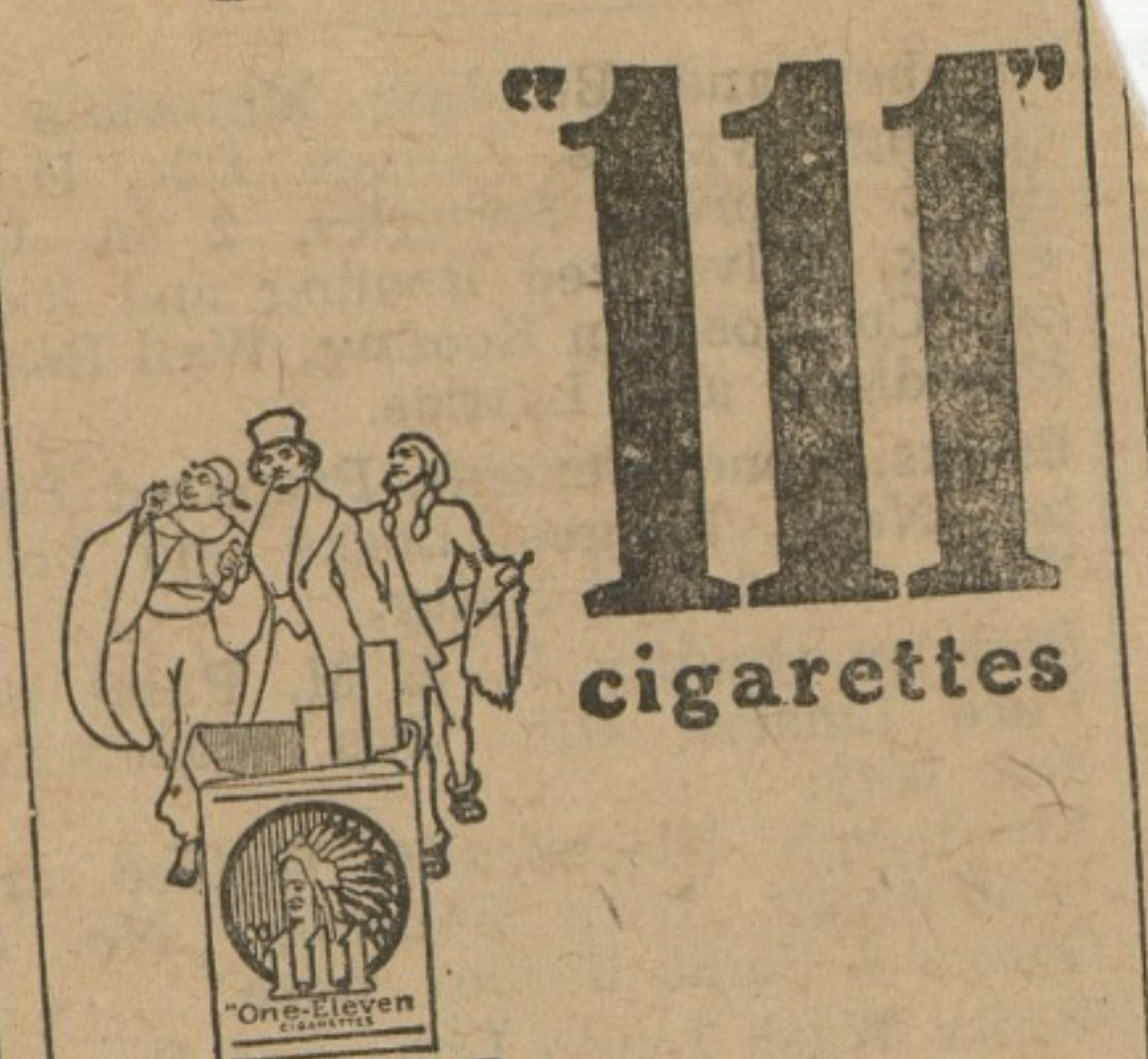

 ay prizes offered for ten-ear  
 ts of yellow corn and came  
 with \$120 jingling in their  
 ts as a result. Naturally G. D.  
 augh, of Bynum, Harford coun-  
 attled his money more often and  
 loudly than anybody else for  
 simple reason that he had \$45 as  
 nest egg and kept remembering  
 he had trimmed about 600 of  
 e corn belt farmers by exhibiting  
 best ten ears of yellow corn on  
 planet and winning the champ-  
 ship in this class. The others in  
 ten-ear yellow corn class won  
 their oats, or more properly  
 n, were Garnet Radebaugh, By-  
 n, \$20 for eleventh place; Henry  
 gdon, Forest Hill, \$20 for fifteenth  
 ace; Walter Tucker, Forest Hill,  
 0 for thirty-fourth place; A. D.  
 ort, Elkton, \$10 for thirty-fifth  
 ace; Frank Radebaugh, Bynum, \$5  
 r thirty-seventh place; John Hob-  
 n, Newark, Del., \$5 for forty-  
 ynth place, and G. P. Radebaugh,  
 ynum, \$5 for forty-eighth place.  
 Of the fifty prizes offered for ten-  
 ar exhibits of white corn, Maryland  
 rowers won nine received a total  
 of \$75 with which to purchase Xmas  
 cigars. S. J. Galbreath, of Street,  
 will make the largest purchase of  
 Christmas stogies as he led the field  
 of Maryland exhibitors in this class  
 by landing in twenty-third place for  
 \$15. Other prospective cigar buyers  
 are James Galbreath, Street, twenty-  
 seventh prize of \$10; J. A. Harten-  
 stine, Principio Furnace, thirtieth  
 prize of \$10; E. B. Milbourn, Elkton,  
 thirty-third prize of \$10; Joseph  
 Humberger, Elkton, thirty-fifth prize  
 of \$10; W. R. Harvey, Corbett, thirty-  
 seventh prize of \$5; Charles Gib-  
 son, Principio Furnace, thirty-ninth  
 prize of \$5; John Lippincott, Coloma,  
 forty-ninth prize of \$5; Roy Thomas,  
 Darlington, fiftieth prize of \$5.
