STEAMER TALBOT RUNS INTO THE EMMA GILES

While leaving the Baltimore har-
bor Tuesday afternoon shortly after
five o'clock the Baltimore, Ches-
apeake and Atlantic Railway Com-
pany steamer Talbot which plies be-
tween Cambridge and points on the
Choptank River and Baltimore col-
lided with the steamer Emma Giles
of The Tolchester Company line, and
both boats were injured. The dam-
ages to the Talbot, however, did not
prove to be very serious although it
was necessary for her to return to
the city and have patches put into
the iron plates which protect her
hull.

The Emma Giles was badly dam-
aged and will likely be laid up for
some little time.

The collision occurred during the
dense fog which prevailed late Tues-
day afternoon and evening. The
Talbot did not reach Cambridge un-
til twenty minutes after twelve as
the result of the delay in connection
with the accident.

Trapped Rabbits Being Released

The State Conservation Com-
mission through Deputy State Con-
servation Warden, E. Joseph Watson, has
purchasing from Kent county trap-
pers all rabbits caught before Jan-
uary 1st, at one dollar for release
that section.

By releasing the cotton-tails in the
section where they are trapped, it
is believed that a method of restocking
the county will be established and re-
sult in a greater abundance of the
game.
