CHAS. R. CHURCHMAN
DIES OF PNEUMONIA

A brief illness of pneumonia resulted, Friday afternoon, in the death of Charles R. Churchman, vice-president of the Continental Life Insurance Co., at his home in Ridley Park, Pa. He was 41 years old. Born in Wilmington and a resident of the city for many years, he had a host of friends there. He had been ill only about a week and previous to that time had been in excellent health. A wife and four children survive Mr. Churchman.

Mr. Churchman had been associated with the Continental Life Insurance Co., almost from its inception first as a clerk and then successively as secretary, actuary and vice-president and recently as a director as well. An official of the company said of him: "Wholly unassuming and of a retiring disposition, his unusual capacity and the great value of his work to the company could not be fully apparent except to those who were closely associated with him."

"In his death the Continental suffers a loss which it would be difficult to overestimate, while his associates feel a sense of personal bereavement, which is eloquent testimony of the loveableness of his character."
