

among the British dead. The Americans lost 152 killed, 521 wounded, and nearly 400 captured. Generals Sterling, Conway, and Wayne had their horses shot from under them, and the latter, on October 6, wrote Mrs. Wayne: "...my poor horse Received one Musket Ball in the breast and one in the flank at the same Instant that I had a slight touch on my left hand, which is scarcely worth mentioning."

Marylanders fared particularly badly in the battle. Samuel Chase wrote Governor Johnson on October 10 that in Col. John Hoskins Stone's Regiment, Stone himself had been shot through the ankle and that was "in too much pain to bear Removal at this Time" to a hospital. Chase added that

Major [Uriah] Forrest had his Thigh broke by a Musquet Ball. Capt. [Benjamin] Brookes received a Ball through the Mouth which split his Tongue & went out at the back of his Jaw-Bone. Capt. [William Sprigg] Bowie was wounded slightly in the shoulder. Capt. [Levin] Lawrence was also slightly wounded. Col. [Josias Carvill] Hall's Horse ran away with & flung him, but he is not much hurt. Major [James] Cox of Baltimore Town is killed, and Col. [Luke] Marbury is missing. A few subalterns weare (sic) killed and several others wounded.

Forrest's injury to his leg was so severe that it eventually had to be amputated. John Eager Howard, who commanded the Fourth Maryland Regiment, later added a bit of information relating to Col. Hall's injury:

Colonel Hall, who was on foot, ordered me to bring up the Company that had crossed the road; but finding them engaged from behind houses, with some of the enemy, who, I supposed, had belonged to the picket, I judged it not proper to call them off, as it would expose our flank. I reported to Col. Hall, who then desired me to let him have my horse, and said he would bring them up himself. Riding one way and looking another, the horse run him under a cider-press, and he was so hurt that he was taken from the field.

Of James Cox we know from a letter written on October 7 from headquarters, a letter addressed to his widow was dispatched from Washington's headquarters stating that Cox
