TEN DAYS LATER FROM MEXICO.
By the southern mail last night we have
received an extra from the office of the N.
Orleans Picayune, dated Sunday, April 20,
giving advices from Vera Cruz, received
by the schooner Fanny to the 11th inst.
Mexico has not declared war against
the United States; but the official paper,
El Diario del Gobierno, of the 31st instant,
announces that it is in possession of cer-

constrained to withhold from the public;
