

REFORM.

It is now admitted on all hands, that the people of Maryland have had enough of slavery, and that the government will of course pass into the hands of the Democracy, where it rightfully belongs. The election of Pratt, and the imposition of stamp act taxes, and other kindred measures, calamitous as they are, will do much good, for the Democracy will open their eyes to the necessity of a radical reform in the affairs of this State. There remains so much of the old federal aristocracy in our laws and usages, that it required just such a catastrophe as the election of Pratt, to bring out the determined spirit of reform which exists among the true Democrats of Maryland.—That spirit is now roused, and we trust it will never rest till a thorough reformation is effected, and every vestige of aristocracy driven from the State, and our statute books, instead of confused jargon of edicts for the benefit of a few, shall be a code of equal, just, and intelligible laws. Economy must take the place of extravagance, and as a motto, equal rights and general laws must take the place of special privileges and private statutes. The annual expenses of the Government of this State, besides the interest on its debt, amounting to some \$235,000 must be placed in a position to sustain their credit, without oppressive taxes. We shall summarize the details of the measures, which upon the expansion of the whigs, we hope to see established, and we invite the co-operation of all men who wish well to the State.

First. The Governor should be chosen annually, and his compensation should not exceed \$20,000 per annum; and let the people appoint their own officers, except the Judges. As to the residence of the Governor, let him be where he chooses, for there is no more necessity for his living at Annapolis, than there is that he should wear sheep skin breeches. The notion of a government mansion, and a residence there, is one of the relics of British aristocracy, which ought to be abandoned. During the session of the General Assembly, he will of course be at their place of meeting, but upon their adjournment, there is no more necessity for his remaining there than that the Senators should. His residence can just as well be done at his own residence, at Baltimore, Prince George's or Frederick, or wherever he may live as at Annapolis. Let the power return annually to the people, let him live at home, and let his pay be reduced, and one of the worst encroachments upon true republicanism will be removed.

Second. The whole body of Insolvent Laws should be repealed, and that shameful relic, not of British aristocracy, but of the barbarism of dark ages, the debtors imprisonment, should be abolished. As a substitute, let there be a simple enactment, that the defendant in any action founded on debt, may on the rendition of judgment against him, on notice and in a mode having respect to the right of all parties, submit himself to an examination on oath before the court giving the judgment, as to any allegation of fraud, either in contracting the debt, or avoiding the payment, and upon his appearing to the court that he has acted fairly, let execution issue against his property and credits, and not against his body.—A more unjust, not to say iniquitous system, than that which prevails here, especially in this city, cannot well be conceived of, and one of the first acts of the Democracy should be to rid the State of it as a common nuisance. Scores and scores of men are every month hanging round the doors of the insolvent courts, to pay themselves sometimes from imprisonment for debts which they cannot pay, and sometimes to seek the aid of the law in a scheme to cheat their creditors; and in a vast amount of cases, the expenses which they incur is about equal to their debts. An honest man should not be exposed to imprisonment, and a rascal should not be allowed to go free; but both results, wrong as they are, happen under our present system. Let the whole thing be cut up root and branch.

Third. The whole system of private legislation, which now constitutes nine-tenths of the business of the General Assembly, and is done at the annual cost to the people of at least \$30,000, should be abandoned, and the rights of the whole people protected by general laws. Instead of the present mode of creating corporate rights, by which the community are exposed to injustice and fraud, in numerous cases; let one general law be made providing for the organization of all corporations, requiring a record of all corporations, requiring a record of the purpose by the county Clerk, and let all corporations be subjected to the control of the General Assembly.

Fourth. The outrage upon the rights of the people, by which three or four fed politicians in this city reserve some \$30,000 in fees of office, and a similar number in all the other counties a proportional amount, should be forthwith broken up. The duties of the Clerks of the Courts and Register of Deeds should be separated, and done by the people, of each county annually, or once in two years, to take charge of the records of deeds, and to be compensated for his services by one half the present charge for recording deeds.—Let the clerk of Baltimore County Court and the Register of Wills receive 1500 dollars a year each, and the Clerk of the City Court 1000 dollars, sums amply sufficient to command competent officers. Let the Clerks fees in Courts be reduced to a reasonable sum, and the balance paid into the State Treasury. That three or four men respectable though they may be as men, should be permitted to levy from the community a tax of 8 or 10,000 dollars a year each, while the people are ground to the dust by stamp acts and other enormous charges, is so monstrously unjust and iniquitous, that no Republican can hesitate to demand a reform. We know the stamp acts will reform, but we do not propose to consult them—the people demand this change, and the people must and will be obeyed.

Fifth.

The Judiciary system, by which some eighty-five Judges are maintained at the public expense, must be thoroughly reformed, and the judicial expenses reduced. The people have already spoken on this subject. Let there be six District Judges, to hold the Courts in the several counties, and let them interchange with each other, and distribute the entire work of the State among themselves, as the public interest shall require, one Judge holding a Court, and let the Court of Appeals be a separate Court, to be composed of three or four Judges, and let that Court hold one term a year in each of the districts, and there dispose of the appeals arising in each district. The enormous expense of requiring people from all parts of the State to go to Annapolis to try their cases must be prevented. Give the Chief Justice \$2500 salary, the two Associate Judges \$1800 each. Appoint one Orphan and Court Judge in each county, to do the duties of Probate, &c., and let him appoint a clerk with a salary not to exceed \$600, and let his own salary not exceed \$1000, and the compensation of both to be collected in the fees of office. An additional compensation might be required for the office of Chancellor and Attorney General, and let each Judge be chancellor and each county have a prosecuting attorney.

Sixth. The Treasurer of the State, and the Secretary of the State must be chosen annually by the people, with a salary, the annually by the latter of \$1200, former of \$1000, and let them appoint a clerk with a salary not to exceed \$600, and let his own salary not exceed \$1000, and the compensation of both to be collected in the fees of office. An additional compensation might be required for the office of Chancellor and Attorney General, and let each Judge be chancellor and each county have a prosecuting attorney.

Seventh. The Baltimore City Court, which in its present organization, (we speak not of the Judges, who are, we believe, very clever men, but of the system,) is a public nuisance, must be entirely reformed, and the whole system of planning Justices of the Peace all over the city as spongers general of the people, must be abolished; but we have not now time to point out the necessary changes, and will do it another time.

There are divers other traits of aristocracy and whiggery which we must reform, and we will speak of them hereafter. Let the Democracy stand firm, and we pledge ourselves that better times will soon come.

THE BATTLE OF NEW ORLEANS.

The following letter addressed by General Jackson to his victorious troops after the battle of New Orleans, as published in the Philadelphia Aurora of Feb. 3, 1812, will be read, with interest that patriotism and fervent devotion to the prosperity and glory of his country which has distinguished his whole life.

ADDRESS.

Directed, by Major General Jackson, to be read at the head of each of the corps composing the line below New Orleans, January 21, 1812.

Citizens and Fellow Soldiers!—The enemy has retreated, and your General has now leisure, to proclaim to the world what he has noticed with admiration and praise—your undaunted courage, your patriotism and your patience, under hardships and fatigues. The various and different States, acting in concert, have in language different of viewing in these circumstances the germ of distrust and division, you have made them the source of an honorable emulation, and from the seeds of discord itself have reaped the fruit of a glorious victory. This day completes the fourth week since a number of men, who attacked treacherously your ranks, and their leader, under a celebrated leader, in a service of great importance, attacked them from an impromptu fort, which they cannot pay, and sometimes to seek the aid of the law in a scheme to cheat their creditors; and in a vast amount of cases, the expenses which they incur is about equal to their debts. 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By shouts of defiance, by a manly countenance, not to be shaken by the roar of his cannon; by the glare of his firework rockets; by an artillery served with superior skill, and with deadly effect. Never, my brave friends, can your General forget the testimonials of attachment to our glorious cause, of indignation hatred to our foe, of affectionate confidence in your chief, that resounded from every rank, as he passed along your line. This animating and unexpected scene dampened the courage of the enemy; he dropped his scaling ladders and fascines, and the threatening clouds dwindled into a demonstration, which served only to show the impotence

POSTSCRIPT.

Federal Procession at Louisville.—The citizens of Louisville have determined to have a federal procession in honor of President Jackson, on the 3d of July. It is expected that after the Hon. Wm. O. Butler, ex-President Houston, of Texas, will deliver an oration on the occasion.

Chief Justice Taney heads the list, followed by the most distinguished gentlemen of both parties in the city. Our right had only a short contest to sustain with a few rash men, who finally for themselves, forced their entrance into the unfinished redoubt on the river. They were quickly dispossessed, and this glorious day terminated with the loss to the enemy of their commander in chief and one major general killed, another wounded, the most experienced and bravest of their officers, and more than three thousand men killed, wounded, and missing; while our ranks, my friends, were thinned only by the loss of six of our brave companions killed, and seven disabled by wounds—wonderful interposition of Heaven! unexampled event in the history of war!

Let us be grateful to the God of battles who has directed the arrows of indignation against our invaders, while he covered with his protecting shield the brave defenders of their country.

After this unsuccessful and disastrous attempt, their spirits were broken, their force was destroyed, and their whole attention was employed in providing the means of escape. This they have effected; leaving their heavy artillery in our power, and many of their wounded to our merciful hands.

The consequences of our not decisive campaign, are not only our impotent, but the loss of our arrogant enemy humbled, his forces broken, his leaders killed, his insolent hopes of our disunion frustrated; his expectation of rioting in our spoils and wasting our country changed into ignominious defeat, shameful flight, and a reluctant acknowledgment of our humanity and kindness to those whom he had treated as all the horrors and humiliations of a conquered state.

On the other side, unanimity established, disaffection crushed, confidence restored; your country saved from conquest; your property from pillage, your wives and daughters from insult and violation; the union preserved from dismemberment; and perhaps a period put to our long and bloody and savage war. These my brave friends, are the consequences of your efforts you have made, and the success with which they have been crowned by Heaven.

These important results have been effected by the united courage and perseverance of the army; but which the different corps as well as the individuals that compose it, have vied with each other in their exertions to produce. The share you have respectively had will be pointed out in the general orders accompanying this address. But the gratitude, the admiration of your country, offers a firmer reward than that which any praises of the General can bestow, and the best is that of which they can never be deprived, the consciousness of having done their duty, and of meriting the applause they will receive.
