Wheat (which is the principal crop raised for sale) is worth about eighty cents per bushel at Fort Vancouver. This price is not paid in money, but in goods, at a low rate. Money will not purchase goods as low, by 20 per cent., as wheat or beaver-skins. Mr. Sutton is so well satisfied with the country, that he designs to return and remain there. If emigrants should continue to pass into Oregon for a few years as rapidly as they have the present year, the people will soon be able to protect themselves from the rapacity of the British Hudson Bay and Northwestern Fur Companies. The settlement has now a military company well commanded.

The settlers are patient, expecting the United States to protect the rights of her own citizens in her own territory? Well expressed, Mr. Sutton, eloquently as he is, and they shall not wait in vain! If the Government should prove recalcitrant to its duty—which we have no fear—the nation would cry shame upon the temporizing and miserable policy which, by neglecting to provide for the safety of the people of Oregon, would force them to acknowledge the supremacy of Great Britain; and thus add another large province to that already overgrown empire. This question has now forced itself into such a position, that it will, beyond question, constitute one of the most prominent subjects which will be brought before Congress during the ensuing session. Let all, therefore, who feel interested in the fate of their countrymen in those distant regions, join in petitioning Congress for justice and protection to Oregon. It is a cry that will stir the hearts of the people of this Republic, like that which of old echoed through the camp, and the serried ranks of the soldiers of the cross, on their triumphal way to the Holy Land—"God will!" Justice and protection to Oregon!"—New York Sun.
