CONFESSION OF ADAM HORN.—This man (now under sentence of death in the jail of Baltimore county) has made a full confession, comprising a narrative of his early history as well as a full detail of the awful murder of which he is now convicted.

HORN is to be executed on Friday the 29th inst.

DECLINES THE HONOR.—Among those who have been spoken of as a candidate for Governor on the side of the democrats, is Gen. B. C. Howard. The Republican has published a letter from him, in which he positively declines being a candidate.

THE MESSAGE.—The credited state of our columns forbid us giving an extended notice of this document to-day. There is much in it we admire, and the language of the President in reference to our affairs with Mexico will meet with general approval. It partakes of the spirit of "Old Hickory." Upon the Oregon question the President speaks fearlessly, and recommends the establishment of a chain of fortifications to protect the line of emigrant travel to that country. He briefly refers to his former fiscal proposition (the Exchequer) but it can hardly be said that he recommends it. Our foreign affairs, and indeed all the subjects of National interest, are presented in the message, which taken as a whole cannot fail to engage the reader's attention.

MISSISSIPPI.—Returns of the election for Governor in all seven counties, give Brown (Dem.) 19,056; Clayton (Whig) 15,538—majority 3,218.

LAZER.—FINAL RETURNS.—The Free Trader of the 22d, announces as the final result of the election in Mississippi, that the Democracy have chosen four Democratic members of Congress, a democratic Governor, a democratic Secretary of State, a democratic Auditor, a democratic State Treasurer, and have secured a democratic majority of eight in the Senate, and of twenty-five in the House of Representatives.

CONGRESS.—The first session of the 28th Congress opened without any of the difficulty that was anticipated in reference to its organization. Much of the time of the House has been occupied in considering the protest tendered by Mr. Barnard of New York, against the admission of the Delegations of Mississippi, Missouri, Georgia, and New Hampshire into the House of Representatives as members. These States elected by General ticket.

THE DEMOCRATIC SPEAKER.—The National Intelligencer says:—"The gentleman who has been honored by the appointment of SPEAKER of the House of Representatives is an old Member of Congress, having, previous to the last Session, filled the office of Chairman of the Committee of Ways and Means, and being of course, familiar with the rules and practice of the House. With a general gravity of deportment is united within him a uniform courteousness, which becomes the station to which he is called.

Important British Naval Movement.—The Halifax Post of the 28th November states that Vice Admiral Sir Charles Adams departed from that port with a fleet on the 26th, for Central America, and remarks that the business the fleet is concerned in is of deep importance. Some old "officials" are alluded to, as well as the more recent contempt shown to the British flag at a party where the British Minister was present, and what is, probably, more grievous than all the rest—the restrictive tariff of Santa Anna, injurious to British trade. Sir Charles thinks to do something by way of remedy.

The President's Message was received in New York on Tuesday night, at fifteen minutes before 12 o'clock by Washington time—twelve o'clock by that of New York. The message left Washington 20 minutes before 2 o'clock, P. M. and was consequently about ten hours in reaching New York.

Reward Offered.—The Governor of Maryland has offered a reward of five hundred dollars, for the apprehension and surrender to the Sheriff of Montgomery county, the villains who murdered a woman, near Middlebrook, in that county, in October last.

OHIO.—The whole democratic vote on Congressional candidates at the late election in Ohio was 110,871; the total Whig vote 100,747; Democratic majority on popular vote 10,124!

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER ACADIA.
FIFTEEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

The steamer Acadia arrived at Boston on Wednesday afternoon last.

The State Trials, in Ireland, drag their slow length along. Little progress has yet been made, and, if the statement which has been put forth by the "Times" correspondent be correct, that the defendants have 30,000 witnesses to examine, the proceedings will become the greatest bore in the world, (not excepting even the Thames Tunnel,) before they are finished.

The Great Britain, the mammoth steamer, built and launched at Bristol last summer, is expected at Liverpool before Christmas, and will astonish the good citizens of New York some fine day in the ensuing spring, by challenging their criticism, and, it may be, their admiration.

Mr. Sands, an American merchant of great eminence, has been elected Mayor of Liverpool for the ensuing year.

Gen'l. Duff Green, who has been roughly handled by some of the American papers since he left his native shores on a mission to the court of St. James, has been figuring as the correspondent of the "Times" and other journals. The General has taken up the cudgels against the Rev. Sydney Smith, and considering how unpopular "republicanism" is on this side of the water, it may be well imagined that he has addressed a hostile audience. The "Times" has been "down upon him."

The General enters into calculations, from which he infers, that the President elected next year will not be the Whig Henry Clay, the author of the present exclusive tariff, but either Mr. Calhoun or Mr. Van Buren, his opponents.

Court of Queen's Bench, Nov. 15.—This day being the last allowed for pleading to the indictment against Mr. O'Connell, that gentleman appeared in Court, not to plead, but to show cause why the indictment should be quashed, because the witnesses were sworn before the Grand Jury only, whereas, by an Act of Parliament, 56 George III., they should have been sworn in open Court. The greater part of the day was taken up with argument whether a plea of abatement lodged the day before was in time or not; the counsel for the Crown contending that it should have been lodged when the parties were first charged, and not after the rule to plead had run. It was finally decided by Court that it was in time, and thus an important advantage was gained over the Attorney General; the counsel for the Crown then demurred, and contended to plead to the argument at once, but the traversers refused to do so without notice, and the court agreeing, a four day rule was granted, which delays further proceeding until Monday next, when the validity of the objection will be argued. The question is so entirely one of law, and the matter lies between the technical wording of two separate acts of parliament, that we can give no opinion of the result. Of course, if Mr. O'Connell's objection is good, the proceedings on this indictment would be at end.
