FOREIGN NEWS.—The steamer *Hibernia* arrived at Boston on Wednesday last, with the latest Liverpool and London news. The news is not very important.

Among the passengers is General Duff Green.

It was recently reported, in London, that the differences between Great Britain and Mexico, arising out of the alleged insult to the English flag by Santa Anna, had been satisfactorily arranged between Lord Aberdeen and the representative of Mexico at the Court of St. James.

IRELAND.—The state trials are for the present in abeyance. An interregnum of one six or seven weeks has been allowed to the traversors to prepare the defence.

CONGRESS.—Mr. McDuffie has introduced in the Senate a bill proposing to modify the present Tariff act.

The Washington Globe of Thursday night, in allusion to the business of the house, says—

"The House has been from Saturday last swamped in Mr. Adams's question petitions. This venerable sage has himself, ever since his degradation of the people of the United States, as a centrist in Congress—doing every thing to degrade the people's Government in turn, by distorting its counsels. He has pursued this object by continually interrupting the regular and constitutional business of Congress, by pouring in petitions and memorials on subjects regard to which Congress is forbidden act by the Constitution. Many of these petitions are doubtless forgeries; several presented by him have been detected, and exposed to the contempt of the house. Last year, he introduced one to dissolve the Union, and came near expelling from the House, as punishment for the famous et cetera. Yesterday, he brought in, among others, a petition—in the face of prohibitions of the Constitution, which denies to Congress the right to meddle with religion—praying for a law providing for the confession of national sins!—so as to effect a compromise acknowledging the dominion of God and Saviour, Jesus Christ!"

"As an act making an acknowledgment of the law of God, and praying to every individual in the U. S. States the self-evident truths of the Declaration of Independence—to wit, the right to life, liberty, and happiness?" To-day, Mr. Adams introduced a memorial to alter the apportionment of the taxes according to population, as estimated in that instrument which includes three-fifths of the population.

"In his way, from week to week, and year to year, Mr. Adams has confounded the best of Congress by pressing on its constitutional subjects which it is forbidden to enquire into at all. He forces these interested into the House, under the pretext of a right of petition—which, if inserted into law, would enable him to employ to frustrate his demands—as it is already a great extent—all constitutional and statutory legislation."

ESCAPE FROM PREMATURE BURIAL.—Resuscitation of a Jewess.—We find, in a recent number of the St. Louis Republican an account of a remarkable escape from being buried alive, of a young lady of that city, belonging to a Jewish family. She had been afflicted with a nervous disease, and had as her family supposed, yielded her last breath. According to Jewish custom, the body is taken to the grave yard in a square box, in the same covering in which the deceased person has expired, and there, in a house appropriated for that purpose, the female friends of the family unbind the body, wash it with cold water, and anoint it with its last resting place. While performing this ancient custom upon the body of this supposed inanimate corpse, a healthful warmth evaporated it, and evident signs of life became manifest.—Physicians were immediately sent for, and on their arrival the certainty of her being alive was established, and means were taken to fan the spark into health. This is a remarkable case.
