

ANAPOLIS, Jan. 16, 1844. On motion of Mr. Emmes, the proposition submitted by him some days since as an additional rule, providing that bills and resolutions contemplating taking money out of the Treasury, shall first be submitted to the committee on Claims, or some other appropriate standing committee, before they shall be had thereon.

Resolved, That the Government of the State of Maryland is clothed with those powers only which have not been delegated to the General Government, and that instructions to the Senators and Representatives in Congress, would be a usurpation of the authority of the State, and an assumption by the State of the prerogative of the laws of Congress, which was delegated by the adoption of the Federal Constitution.

Resolved, That Congress has no power to issue or to cause to be issued, paper as money, except as a representation of gold and silver coined; and to issue it because it is to be issued, as the representation of the value of land or any other object than gold and silver, would constitute a deliberate, dangerous and unconstitutional usurpation of the Federal Constitution.

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Federal Constitution, and the exercise of such a power by the General Government, would be a violation of the Constitution, a usurpation of the rights of the States, and highly pernicious in its tendency.
