LICENSE LAW OF MARYLAND.

Enacted an Act to amend the sixty-one, sixty-two, sixty-three, sixty-four, sixty-five...

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth sections of Article five of the Code of Public General Laws...

Section 2. And be it enacted, That if it shall appear from such statement that the applicant's stock in trade does not exceed five hundred dollars...

Section 3. Be it enacted, That if more than five hundred dollars and not more than one thousand dollars the sum of thirty-five dollars...

Section 4. Be it enacted, That if more than one thousand dollars and not more than two thousand dollars, the sum of fifty dollars...

Section 5. If more than two thousand dollars and not more than four thousand dollars, the sum of seventy-five dollars...

Section 6. If more than four thousand dollars and not more than six thousand dollars, the sum of one hundred dollars...

Section 7. If more than six thousand dollars and not more than ten thousand dollars, the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars...

Section 8. If more than ten thousand dollars and not more than twenty thousand dollars the sum of one hundred and thirty dollars...

Section 9. If more than twenty thousand dollars and not more than thirty thousand dollars the sum of one hundred and forty dollars...

Section 10. If more than thirty thousand dollars and not more than fifty thousand dollars the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars shall be demanded and received...

Section 11. No License shall be granted to sell spirituous and fermented liquors or lager beer, in quantities not less than a pint, for the sum of eighteen dollars, unless the person applying therefor shall also obtain a License to sell goods, chattels, wares and merchandise...

Section 12. And be it further enacted, That the eighty-sixth, eighty-seventh, eighty-eighth, eighty-ninth, ninety-first, ninety-second, ninety-third, ninety-fourth, and ninety-fifth sections of Article five of the Code of Public General Laws...

Section 13. And upon such application the said applicant shall pay to the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the county where he resides, or if said applicant shall reside in the city of Baltimore, then to the Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas, the sum of fifty dollars for each and every such License...

Section 14. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect from and after the 1st day of May next.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS NOTICE.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That whenever any person shall make application to the Levy Courts, Commissioners or Appeal Tax Courts, as the case may be, to make him in or her an allowance or deduction on account of the sale, usufruct, loss, destruction or removal of any property or the collection or payment of any public debt or private security for money, it shall be the duty of said Levy Courts, Commissioners or Appeal Tax Courts, to interrogate such person, ON OATH, in reference to the said property or security and disposal of the same, and especially to require him or her by whom the said property has been sold or transferred, the amount of the purchase money, or the money collected and paid, and how the same has been invested; and it shall also be the duty of the Levy Courts, Commissioners or Appeal Tax Courts, to interrogate the said person on oath, in reference to any acquisitions or investments made by the said person, and not already assessed, and the amount of all such acquisitions and investments, in whatever description of security, shall be added to the assessable property of the person so applying, and charged accordingly; and if the person refuse to answer the interrogatories proposed, no deduction shall be made in his or her assessment.
