LICENSE LAW OF MARYLAND.

Passed by the General Assembly at the January Session 1860.

A BILL

Entitled An Act to amend the sixty-one, sixty-two, sixty-three, sixty-four, sixty-five, sixty-six, sixty-seven, sixty-eight and sixty-ninth sections of Article fifty-five of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to Licenses for the sale of Spirits or Fermented Liquors by Retailers, and to amend the eighty-sixth, eighty-seventh, eighty-eighth, eighty-ninth, ninety-first, ninety-second, ninety-third and ninety-fourth Sections of Article ninety-five of the Code of Public General Laws relating to the Licenses of Oyster and Eating Houses.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth sections of Article fifty-five of the Code of Public General Laws relating to Licenses, are hereby repealed, and the following sections enacted therefor.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That if it shall appear from such statement that the applicant's stock in trade does not exceed five hundred dollars the sum of eighteen dollars shall be demanded and received by said Clerk from said applicant before granting the License applied for.

SEC. 3. Be it enacted, That if more than five hundred dollars and not more than one thousand dollars the sum of thirty-five dollars.

SEC. 4. Be it enacted, That if more than one thousand dollars and not more than two thousand dollars, the sum of fifty dollars.

SEC. 5. If more than two thousand dollars and not more than four thousand dollars, the sum of seventy-five dollars.

SEC. 6. If more than four thousand dollars and not more than six thousand dollars, the sum of one hundred dollars.

SEC. 7. If more than six thousand dollars and not more than ten thousand dollars, the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars.

SEC. 8. If more than ten thousand dollars and not more than twenty thousand dollars the sum of one hundred and thirty dollars.

SEC. 9. If more than twenty thousand dollars and not more than thirty thousand dollars, the sum of one hundred and forty dollars.

SEC. 10. If more than thirty thousand dollars and not more than fifty thousand dollars shall be demanded and received by the said Clerk before granting to the applicant the License applied for.

SEC. 11. No License shall be granted to sell spirits and fermented liquors or lager beer, in quantities not less than a pint, for the sum of eighteen dollars, unless the person applying therefor shall also obtain a License to sell goods, chattels wares and merchandise, paying therefor the sum hereinbefore prescribed according to the amount of his stock in trade.

SEC. 12. And be it further enacted, That the eighty-sixth, eighty-seventh, eighty-eighth, eighty-ninth, ninety-first, ninety-second, ninety-third, ninety-fourth, and ninety-ninth sections of Article fifty-five of the Code of Public General Laws, relating to the Licenses to Oyster and Eating Houses, Ordinary Keepers; are hereby repealed, and the following sections enacted as a substitute therefor.

SEC. 13. And upon such application the said applicant shall pay to the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the county where he resides, or if said applicant shall reside in the city of Baltimore, then to the Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas, the sum of fifty dollars for each and every such License.

SEC. 14. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect from and after the 1st day of May next.
