BRYAN'S AGRICULTURAL MUDLIFTER. A Strong and Durable Machine, which can be worked by ordinary Farm Hands.

Worked by two horses and will raise 15 Cart Loads per hour, only requiring one man to operate it.

THE purpose of this machine is to raise the deposit from the bottom of ravines, coves creeks, rivers or other places inaccessible to teams.

This Machine raises the mud, brings it on shore, deposits into a hopper, under which a cart can be driven, and receives its load by means of a slide moved by the driver, by which all labor of shoveling is avoided.

The bucket is made of the best boiler iron, and is so constructed that it dumps the mud into the hopper, and by reversing the capstan, adjusts itself and is carried out for another load.

By referring to a drawing and clear explanations sent with each machine any ordinary carpenter can put one up without difficulty.

But a few pieces of roughly hewn timber are required for the frame. Everything else complete with chain and rope enough to send the bucket 170 feet from the capstan, is furnished in Baltimore for the sum of \$225 cash.
