

CENTREVILLE STATE RIGHTS.

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TUESDAY MORNING, NOV. 27, 1860.

The Baltimore American, after observing particularly and noting carefully the expressions of sentiment by the press of Maryland upon the all-absorbing issue of the day, has made the discovery that the Patasco Enterprise and the Centreville State Rights are the only disunion newspapers in this State.

In what, then, does the difference between them consist, in the present crisis. Those, who are now advocating the policy of a withdrawal from the Union, by one or all of the Southern States, are alone disunionists, in the sense in which we understand that term; while those, who doubting the policy, recognize the right of withdrawal, and the duty of defending that right, if resisted by the Federal power, in the event of its exercise by one or many of the States, are secessionists, but not ipso facto disunionists.

MEETING OF CONGRESS.—The last session of the 36th Congress commences on the 3d of December, and expires on the 4th of March next.

POSITION OF MD.—AN EXCITING MEETING IN ST. MARY'S CO. A meeting of the citizens of St. Mary's county, Md. was held at Leonardtown, on Tuesday evening last, for the purpose of memorializing Gov. Hicks to call the Legislature together. It was largely attended, and considerable excitement was manifested.
