

Senate 1864

1. Dr Waters, Mo. detained on account of indisposition in his family. 13 Jan 1864. Mr Waters voted on 22 Jan.
2. The Committee on Elections reported. 20 February 1864. about the military interference in the election of 3 and 4 November 1863. The report included a proclamation by the governor, The General Order #53 issued by Gen Schenck, a note from A. Lincoln revoking first three of the general orders, allowing for arrest of persons loitering about the polls, it directs the military to prevent violence; and description of what occurred by the committee; Resolutions were offered against General Order 53, and against the suppression of the Governor's proclamation and were made the order of the day, March 2.
3. Resignation of J. B. Ricard received Mar. 9. 1864.
4. The constitution of 1864 divided Baltimore City into three legislative districts, and gave a senator and 6 delegates to each district. Each county was allotted a senator, and representation was made on the basis of population.
