

General Assembly of 1791-1792

Adjourned until November 8, 1791 when a sufficient number were present.

Jeremiah Crabb, speaker pro tem, December 12 - December 30, 1791; Winder was elected speaker once again at the start of the Second Session.

3

It was brought to the notice of the House on December 13, 1791 that Key and Worthington, as associate justices in their respective county courts, were not qualified under the constitution to hold seats in the House of Delegates. The problem was not mentioned again until April 6, 1792 when a resolution was put forward calling attention to the fact that Bowie, Tilghman, Secombe, Crabb, and Wilkinson, as well as Key, had been associate justices at the time of the last election and were not entitled to their

It is not clear whether the Dantt named to the Committee on Laws to Expire was Thomas Dantt, Jr. of Calvert County or Thomas Dantt of Prince George's County.

Governor Plater died on February 10, 1792. James Brice, the first named in the Council, served as acting governor until Thomas Sim Lee was elected governor on April 3, 1792.

The membership of these committees was not announced during the Second Session.

8 Latimer refused to qualify for the Council, so that on Dec 30, 1791 the council proceeded to ballot for a member of the council. Col Wm Forrest and Thomas Jennings each had 2 votes. The election was postponed. On Dec 31, 1791 another ballot showed Col Forrest had a majority of the votes and was duly elected.

Latimer was appointed State Agent. (p 90)
