1 Philip Barton Key brought to the notice of the Committee of Elections and Privileges a memorial stating that the election of delegates for the city of Annapolis had been illegally held. Key testified before the House on November 18, 1800, but to no avail. On the following day the House resolved that Allen Zuyunn and John Johnson were entitled to hold their seats.

2 No explanation appears in the proceedings for the discharge of Johnson from the Committee of Elections and Privileges and the addition of Smith, of Baltimore on November 10, 1800.

3 Nelson was elected speaker pro tem on December 16, 1800, to replace Hall. The latter returned as speaker on the following day.

4 On December 19, 1800, the House resolved unanimously, "That the thanks of this house be presented to Edward Hall, Esquire, in testimony of our approbation of his conduct in the chair, and of his ability, impartiality and attention, manifested in the discharge of the various duties assigned him as speaker of this house."

5. The Council met ^{on} November 12, 1800.
