

In the next place Dr. Luffin's testimony is a denial of all knowledge of the murder - and of all acts or practices tending to complicate the matter - Without either meaning to attempt to account for the measures in which they claim to be placed when they were found - or to bring ^{specific} charges of crime against either L. or any other person

Yet he cannot be responsible for the consequences which result from the strict examination of the testimony of L., if the result be either to raise suspicion against him - or to fix the charge decidedly upon him, he cannot but be justified in his own self defence to pursue the investigation without shrinking from it, or aware of any possible consequences.
