

These searches would excite fear - or create
 confidence - & it is scarcely possible but that
 the effects of the one or the other, or both
 should have been easily more visible than
 the strongest statements respecting his supposed
 agitation have developed.

Prove him also that Dr W. is Constitutionally
 a nervous man, upon whom the influence of
 such cases would be more likely to have
 a visible effect.

Especially - the conduct of Dr W. in his way
 from his house in Cambridge - & his conversation with
 the officers - evinces no consciousness of guilt
 - but as far as human feelings can be

developed by conduct, a consciousness of innocence -

- perfect freedom from all manifestation of

anxiety or solicitude on account of the proposed

additional examination at the Medical College - and

would hardly be possible if he knew that the

Guerrins were actually in his premises & concealed
 when they were found.
