IN RE: FRAUD IN OBTENTION OF OLD AGE PENSION.

Dear Mr. Marshall:

With regard to the inquiry made by Judge Thomas S. J. Waxter, beg to advise that in my opinion his department can with safety accept the \$150.00 offered in restitution by the pensioner. He should deliver to him a simple receipt for the return of this sum of money. Under no condition should any release be given by his department or any employee on his behalf, nor should any promises as to criminal prosecution be made by him or anyone on his behalf.

If Judge Waxter considers it necessary or expedient after the receipt of this sum of money he may refer the case to the State's Attorney's office for such action as they may see fit to take under the circumstances.

Dear Mr. Crozier:

With reference to the right of the City to extend, by permanent structure, Bel Air Market as shown by the yellow lines on the sketch purporting to show "location of brick and closing walls for Bel Air Market", I beg to advise you as follows:

Such construction would appropriate permanently the entire width of the existing sidewalks of the streets shown on the plat for market purposes, leaving no free or open sidewalks for pedestrian purposes, and such use would be of a permanent character and not temporary.
