Dear Mr. Meade:

In accordance with our verbal conversations, I have again considered the question of the liability of the City of Baltimore for persons at Rosewood State Training School.

As I understand the situation, on June 1, 1937, there were a certain number of individuals at Rosewood State Training School who had been admitted to such institution upon a certificate of the Orphans' Court of Baltimore City. It was not until March, 1938, that the Department of Welfare of Baltimore City was able to obtain from Rosewood State Training School the information necessary to investigate the residence of those persons who had theretofore been certified to the institution by the Orphans'
