

25. *Remarks on Friday April 12th 1833* Commences with fine clear weather & very warm one watch on shore the other employed in putting up of ships duty and in painting took on board four barrels of onions and some potatoes from shore this day the Conqueror departed and by what I can learn has gone to the Country
Saturday April 13th 1833 Commences with fine warm weather at 9 AM sent the boat on shore for potatoes at 11 AM relieved rest 12 AM watch employed in ships duty and one watch on shore at 2 PM sent the boat for another load of potatoes returned at 4 PM with 12 AM
Sunday April 14th 1833 Begins with fine weather one watch on shore on liberty the other on board in the afternoon went with a boat crew to help the Montserrat out bound to Baltimore sent a letter by her for her at night watch relieved from shore this day
Monday April 15th 1833 Commences with fine weather and calm boats employed in bringing things from the shore potatoes grapes &c. watch on board getting ready for food and fine weather and warm
Tuesday April 16th 1833 Begins with at 2 PM the boat working on shore for me to go off to John Dordick and Henry D. Keale and endeavor to make their escape from the ship but were pursued and brought back by some men employed by me for that purpose which retained the ship 24 hours from sailing this day shipped Thomas Allen of New Bedford for S. Officer Francis Lorne for Cooper and Charles myself away frequent in getting two fish men on their own way pleasure with Capt
Wednesday April 17th 1833 Commences with fine pleasant weather at 1 PM the Capt of the Post boarded us and brought the ship's papers got under way with a fine breeze in company with a British Brig and went to sea Middle Port fine weather latter much like the former homies employed in getting up water. Lat. Ob. 5° 3' South
Thursday April 18th 1833 Commences with fine weather Watch employed in ships duty Middle Port fine clear weather latter Port much like the former saw a plenty of Porpoises Black fish and birds Lat. Ob. 5° 3' South
Friday April 19th 1833 Begins with moderate breezes from SE and fine pleasant weather at 6 PM showed sail Middle Port fine clear latter Port much like the former at 7 PM saw a large whale towed the boats but was not so fortunate as getting him Lat. Ob. 5° 55' South
Saturday April 20th 1833 Begins with moderate breezes from the SE & SE and fine weather Watch employed in various jobs of ship duty saw some Black fish Middle Port fine clear weather and light winds from East latter Port much like the former the weather of a fine bluish column Lat. Ob. 5° 5' South

26. *Remarks on Sunday April 21st 1833* Begins with moderate breezes from the SE and fine weather Watch employed in ships duty Middle Port fine tender and clear latter much like the former at 8 AM saw a ship steering to the SE under some cloudy N. Obs. the smoke of the ship
Monday April 22nd 1833 Commences with moderate breezes from SE and some cloudy haze too for the sail to the East at 2 PM spoke the ship Gov. Fenner of Bristol 2 months out 1700 blms oil bound off shore the Capt of Fenner came on board and I had letters for him Middle Port light breezes and pleasant latter Port much like the former at 2 PM I went on board of the Gov. Fenner to see Lat. Ob. 6° 42' South
Tuesday April 23rd 1833 Begins with moderate breezes from the SE and fine weather at 6 PM returned from the Gov. Fenner Middle Port fine weather and pleasant latter Port much like the former Lat. Ob. 5° 5' South
Wednesday April 24th 1833 Commences with fine breezes from the SE and clear weather Middle Port moderate breezes and clear then the night latter Port same as the former thermometer shows steady at summer heat and the water has a beautiful blue color appears smooth as a pond saw two ships Lat. Ob. 4° 28' long 102° 42'
Thursday April 25th 1833 Begins with fine breezes from the SE Watch employed in ships duty Middle Port light breezes latter Port much like the former saw one fine bark Middle Port Lat. Ob. 5° 44' South
Friday April 26th 1833 Commences with fine clear weather same as former got a sight of 2 ships from the long 99° 20' Lat. Ob. 5° 57' South
Saturday April 27th 1833 Begins with light breezes from the SE & SE and fine clear weather pointed the starboard boat Middle Port light winds & clear latter much like the former no whales Lat. Ob. 12° 34' S
Sunday April 28th 1833 Commences with light winds on a squall from the SE & SE at 2 PM Middle Port the same latter no alteration the water is very clear and of a beautiful light blue Lat. Ob. 12° 18' S
Monday April 29th 1833 Begins with moderate breezes and fine clear weather homies employed in ships duty Middle Port strong breezes from the SE and fine food latter Port strong breezes and clear from three ships supposed them to be whales no whales in pots Lat. Ob. 12° 36' S
Tuesday April 30th 1833 Commences with strong breezes from the SE at 6 PM took in the M 8° and took 2 oars in the top 8° Middle Port strong winds from the SE & SE and some cloudy at 6 AM made sail latter Port much like the former have not seen any whales yet two ships to the North Lat. Ob. 12° 25' South long 102°
