 Saturday July 27th 1833. Begins with strong breezes from the S.W. & fine weather. All necessary sail mended & repaired & allowed it. 8 P.M. again Middle Port moderate breezes Latter Port much like the former saw nothing. Lat by Obs. 36° 18' South from same head in.
 Sunday July 28th 1833. Commences with moderate breezes and fine weather. People employed in necessary jobs of ship. Middle Port fine clear weather Latter like the former. Lat Obs. 35° 25' South.
 Monday July 29th 1833. Begins with moderate winds from the S.W. & fine weather. Saw a ship to the S.W. & fine back. Latter Port fine clear weather Latter much like the former. Lat Obs. 35° 18' S.
 Tuesday July 30th 1833. Commences with light winds and fine weather. At 3 P.M. spoke the ship Mary of Nantucket Capt. Redden 24 months out with 1150 bbls. of oil. Capt. P. came aboard and told Capt. P. informed me that he had spoken the ship Providence of Bristol 11 months out with 1000 bbls. Middle Port fresh breezes and clear weather. Latter much like the former. N.E. Whaler. Lat Obs. 35° 24' Long 112° 10' W.
 Wednesday July 31st 1833. Begins with moderate breezes from the S.W. & fine pleasant weather. Saw a ship to the East of us. Middle Port & Latter Port much like the former. Lat Obs. 35° 19' S.
 Thursday August 1st 1833. Has commenced with fine clear weather and wind from the S.W. to S.E. at 8 P.M. touched to North. At 11 P.M. to the N.E. Middle Port moderate and clear at 3 P.M. touched South. Latter Port pleasant weather and light winds. Lat Obs. 35° 22' Long 112° 30' W.
 Friday August 2nd 1833. Begins with fresh breezes and fine clear weather. At 5 P.M. saw a ship cutting in a whale supposed to be the Mary last Providence. Middle Port moderate winds and clear. Latter much like the former. Lat Obs. 35° 35' S. On the night of 2nd of whale voyage and no whales to be seen. nearly a month since we got a whale.

P. came aboard and told Capt. P. informed me that he had spoken the ship Providence of Bristol 11 months out with 1000 bbls. Middle Port fresh breezes and clear weather. Latter much like the former. N.E. Whaler. Lat Obs. 35° 24' Long 112° 10' W.
 Friday August 9th 1833. Begins with moderate breezes from the S.W. & fine pleasant weather. Saw a ship to the East of us. Middle Port & Latter Port much like the former. Lat Obs. 35° 19' S.
 Saturday August 10th 1833. Begins with moderate fine and clear weather. The 9th at 8 P.M. spoke the ship Mary of Nantucket Capt. Redden 24 months out with 1150 bbls. of oil. Capt. P. came aboard and told Capt. P. informed me that he had spoken the ship Providence of Bristol 11 months out with 1000 bbls. Middle Port fresh breezes and clear weather. Latter much like the former. N.E. Whaler. Lat Obs. 35° 24' Long 112° 10' W.
 Sunday August 11th 1833. Begins with light pleasant weather. Middle Port & Latter Port moderate. At 6 P.M. saw a large sperm whale at 8 P.M. lowered the boats, but frightened him with the 1st Officer's boat in trying to get the 3rd Officer's chance from him. and of course shall be a rough trip by him in my opinion. Lat 42° 25' Long 115° 50' 30' W. -
