

22. *Remarks on Board August 2nd Thursday 1833.*
 Begins with strong winds from the S.E. & S. and fine pleasant weather.
 Ship under single reefed top S^{ts}. Course S. by E. and Spreader on a wire to South.
 Middle Port more moderate as the reef out of the top sails. Latter Port
 moderate and cloudy while washing fore-castle. Lat. 06. 02. 14 North
Friday August 3rd 1833 Begins with fine breezes from the E. by S. more
 all sail to hurray to the birth. Middle Port tight winds and fine clear
 weather. Latter Port much like the former. Saw nothing. Lat. 06. 00. 45. S.
Saturday August 4th 1833 Commences with tight winds from S. by E.
 ship under all sail at 2 P.M. bringing to in top 98th 387 reefed the fore &
 Mst top S^{ts}. Middle Port fresh winds with a high sea. Latter Port high
 winds from the S. and a great swell from the East. Lat. 06. 07. 16 South
Sunday September 1st 1833. Commences with strong winds from
 the S. by E. and fine clear weather. opened a cask of bread and found
 it very wormy owing to bad packing. Middle part fine weather.
 Latter much like the former. Lat. 06. 25. 58 S. Therm bar heat
Monday September 2nd 1833. Begins with moderate breezes from
 S. by E. and fine clear weather. Middle part tight and clear
 at 7 A.M. commenced breaking out for cooping the provisions.
 Latter Port much as the former. Lat. by Obs. 0. 23 South under fine
Tuesday September 3rd 1833. Commences with tight breezes and
 fine weather. all hands employed in breaking out provisions for
 cooping. Middle Port moderate breezes and fine weather at 6 A.M.
 were off and steered S. by E. Latter much like the former. took out all
 reef and hauled to the N.W. the mizzen of a Whaling voyage
 without a hauler a constant anxiety. Lat. 06. 2. 30 South bar 1/4 in.
Wednesday September 4th 1833. Begins with moderate winds
 and fine weather as usual winds from the S. by E. at 6 P.M. luffed by
 the wind and doubled reefed the top S^{ts}. Middle and Latter Port
 rough with high winds and nothing to be seen like a Whale
 not so much as a black fish. Lat. by Mer. 06. 7. 00 S. therm bar heat
Thursday September 5th 1833. Begins with strong winds and
 a rough sea doubled reefed the top S^{ts}. at 6 P.M. took in Mst sail and won
 ship to North. Latter Port much like the former. Lat. 06. 03. 45 S.
Friday September 6th 1833. has commenced with strong winds
 from the S. E. and fine weather. at 6 P.M. were ship to the N. by E.
 Middle Port some squally with a rough sea. Latter Port much
 like the former. At 6 A.M. the Mst at 8 took it in again. squally
 with some rain and no whales to be seen. Lat. by Obs. 06. 13. 16 South
 Longt. by Obs. 119. 76. 50 West from London 448 1/2 miles.

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 Remarks on Board Salustia 7th September 1833.
 Begins with strong winds from the S.E. to S.W. and very rough &
 some squally. At 6 P.M. wore ship to the N.W. Middle Point strong breezes
 and squally. At 10 A.M. the M^o 8th latter Port much like the former
 but no whales nor nothing that indicates. Whale had 22° 40' S by 119° 50' 43"
 Sunday September 8th 1833. Commences with fresh breezes from S.E. to S.W.
 At 6 P.M. kept off S.W. until 6 P.M. then hauled on the wind hauled in
 to N.W. Middle Point strong breezes and squally with light showery
 rain. At 6 A.M. wore ship to South 8 N.W. Head. Lat. 22° 40' S Long 120° 18' 45" W.
 Monday September 9th 1833. Begins with strong winds from
 the S.E. to S.W. At 6 P.M. wore ship to the N.W. P. horse employed night on rigging
 on this day in raising the holy petrels and mauling on the good
 ship of God. it being with us now the Sabbath according to his account
 Middle Point strong winds and some squally. At 6 A.M. wore ship &
 began S.W. latter Port much like the former. Lat. by Obs. 22° 48' S by 120° 18' 45"
 Tuesday September 10th 1833. Commences with strong winds and
 rough sea and some squally. At 6 P.M. wore ship to the North took in gill
 nets the fore top 8°. Middle Point strong breezes & some squally.
 latter Port more moderate made sail Lat. 22° 32' S Long 120° 32' 45" W.
 Wednesday September 11th 1833. Commences with moderate breezes.
 but quite rough. At 6 P.M. breezing took in the M^o 8th Middle Point fresh
 breezes and rough. At 8 P.M. began to break out aft to Cooper the flour
 and bread and estimated that we had 12333 lbs of bread in all. Latter Port
 fresh breezes and rugged no whales to be seen in this quarter of the Globe
 this if of all business the most tedious that I ever underlook in my life
 I pray God for his grace that he will make me contented with
 my lot & station Lat. by Obs. 22° 10' S Long by 30 122° 00' 20" W. for done on
 Thursday September 12th 1833. Begins with strong winds from the S.E.
 At 6 P.M. fit the gill & sprinker Middle Point more moderate at 6 A.M. kept
 off S.W. 8. Latter fresh breezes and clear made all sail at noon wore off.
 At 11 A.M. quite rough no whales Lat. by Obs. 22° 16' S Long 122° 40' 20" W.
 Friday September 13th 1833. Commences with fresh breezes from S.E. to
 ship going N.W. with all sail at 6 P.M. hauled by the wind to N.W. single
 rigged the top 8° took in gill & sprinker. Middle Point fresh breezes and fine
 weather. At 6 A.M. kept off S.W. and made all sail latter Port pointed 24°
 Saturday September 14th 1833. Commences with fresh breezes from
 the S.E. People variously employed At 6 P.M. single rigged the top 8° hauled on
 fore & M^o 8th and barked the M^o 8th for the night Middle Point moderate
 breezes and clear weather. At 6 A.M. kept off and made all sail
 Lat. 21° 27' South
