

14. Remarks on Sunday September 15th 1833.

Begins with fresh breezes from the S.E. and fine pleasant weather people employed in various jobs of ship's duty. At 6 P.M. took in the top S.E. and took 2 Breezes in the top S.E. Middle Port moderate and fine ship having by with M.B.P. to the mast at 6 A.M. left off S.W. and made all sail. employed myself in reading the holy scriptures and the prayers of the Church in which it is strange for me to find I take great delights. I hope that God has brought me to see the error of my ways. and I am determined by the help of his great mercy to persevere and to tread down Satan under my feet. My daily prayer to God is that he would give me grace to love my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and in him to believe, amen, cloudy. Lat Ob. 15.26 South.

Monday September 16th 1833. Commences with moderate breeze, and fine cloudy. This is the Sabbath on our sea day commences at noon 12 hours earlier than the civil day every one employed in reading. At 6 P.M. made sail the M.B.P. took in the top S.E. this day I have employed my time in reading the holy scriptures and thinking of my dear wife and children. As though a most merciful God take them under thy guardianship and protection keep them in the hollow of thy hand bless them with thy blessings both temporal & spiritual and permit us O God once more to meet in this world but if it is thy divine will and pleasure that we should not meet in this world. As though give up grace so to him this may meet in the world of spirits there to sing praises to thee and the Lamb forever. Middle Port fine weather and light winds from the S.E. and moderate at 6 A.M. left off S.W. Latter Port moderate winds made clear about M^l and M^l top S.E. and repositioned them Lat Ob. 15.25 South.

Tuesday September 17th 1833. Begins with strong winds from the S.E. at 6 P.M. shortened sail for the night Middle Port strong winds, and fair weather at 8 A.M. left off S.W. combined the fore top S.E. and repositioned a Latter Port much like the former. Latitude by Ob. 15.24 South three hours less.

Wednesday September 18th 1833. Begins with fresh breezes from the S.E. Middle Port strong breezes and some cloudy latter on the former nothing to be seen of the whalebone Lat Ob. 15.30 S Long 125. three hours less.

Thursday September 19th 1833. Begins with moderate winds from S.E. ship running N.E. wind at 6 P.M. took in sail and headed by the wind to North. Middle Port light and clear at 7 P.M. left off to N. Latter Port moderate and clear.

Friday September 20th 1833. Commences with light winds from S.E. & E. harbor employed in ship's duty at 6 P.M. shortened sail and kept to South. Middle Port moderate and fine at 7 left off and made all sail Latter Port moderate winds and fine weather all hands employed in the hold Lat Ob. 15.25 South under the way.

15. Saturday September 21st 1833. Begins with fine breezes from

S.E. People employed in flowing down what tiller we have taken it only 22 lbs and 10 months out at 6 P.M. took in the M. sail and doubled reefed the top sails Middle Port fresh breezes and some cloudy latter much like the former at 6 A.M. made sail to North for nothing Lat by Ob. 15.26 South three hours less.

Sunday September 22nd 1833. Commences with fresh breezes from the S.E. & E. Middle Port more moderate and some cloudy at 7 A.M. made sail to North latter Port fine breezes from S.E. to S.W. and pleasant weather Lat Ob. 15.26 South.

Monday September 23rd 1833. Begins with moderate winds from the S.E. employed as usual on the Sabbath in reading and meditating on the scriptures. Got such feeling as I have never had before God in his mercy grant that they may abide by me and with me for ever more and I pray God for the constant assistance of his holy spirit that these feelings may work out for me or for

some according to eternal night of glory give unto me O God that I may behold thee with all understanding and keep my heart in knowledge and love of thee. I have employed much of my time in thinking of my dear wife and children. I pray God keep them in health and bring the dear parting of my heart to imagine what she shall do to be found. I know and am persuaded that I have a great hindrance to be spiritual and well for which I thank O God forgive me. Middle Port fine weather like the former at 6 A.M. some ship to N.E. and with fine winds and so other hands variously employed Lat Ob. 15.25 North.

Tuesday September 24th 1833. Commences with moderate breezes from the S.E. and fine pleasant weather hands employed in looking out for whales with no effect at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle Port fine pleasant weather and light wind at 6 A.M. made sail and kept off N.E. Latter Port moderate. Lat Ob. 15.24 North.

Wednesday September 25th 1833. Begins with fresh breezes from the S.E. ship running free under all sail at 7 P.M. shortened sail and kept to South. Middle Port moderate and fine at 6 A.M. left off S.W. wind made all sail Latter Port much like the former so under this day have seen nothing. Lat Ob. 15.24 South.

Thursday September 26th 1833. Begins with moderate breezes from the S.E. and fine weather at 7 P.M. lifted by the wind and shortened sail for the night Middle Port moderate and some cloudy latter Port much like the former ship running free from the wind Lat by Ob. 15.26 miles south.

Friday September 27th 1833. Begins with moderate winds from the S.E. and fine weather People employed in necessary jobs of ship's duty at 5 P.M. shortened sail and headed by the wind Middle Port moderate and fine latter much like the former. Lat by Ob. 15.25 South three hours less.

Saturday September 28th 1833. Begins continues and ends with light winds from the S.E. & E. and fine weather at 7 took in sail at 6 A.M. made sail and went to North. Lat by Ob. 15.17 South three hours less.
