

70 Ship Canton Packet Lying at Oahu out Side the B.
 Saturday February 22. 1834 Began with fine breeze from the
 NE and fine weather at 4 PM the boat came on shore for me
 but I concluded I would not go as my legs being very lame
 from the effects of the cough put the boat off with some fresh meat
 and vegetables which we found much in need of. I am much
 disappointed in the village of Honolulu it being much larger
 than I have formed an idea of, the streets quite clean and
 the foreign residents very respectable. on this day fine weather.

Remarks on Sunday Feb. 23. 1834

Began with light breeze from the East and fine weather. at 8 AM
 wind very light at 9 AM wind put off a light breeze from the SE
 part of the Pilot at 10 took the anchor and came in to the harbor
 and came to in 4 fathoms of water fine weather. This day
 I attended church first time since I left home and to hear Mr. D.
 at the Seamen's Chapel. which is the only place of public worship
 in the place except the Native Church. I should suppose there were
 100 whites attending besides natives on this day fine weather.

Remarks on Monday Feb. 24. 1834.

Commenced with light breeze from the SE and fine weather one
 half of the crew on shore on liberty others the sailors and joining
 other jobs employed in calking the ship the being very
 open. this day took tea with Mr. and Mrs. D. on fine weather.

Remarks on Tuesday Feb. 25. 1834

Commenced with moderate breeze from the NE and fine weather
 employed in calking one half the crew on shore on liberty quite
 cool. I am suffering very much from some peculiar feet and
 hardly able to walk and most of the crew the same complaint.

Remarks on Wednesday Feb. 26. 1834

Commenced with moderate breeze and generally with fine weather
 one half the crew on liberty. this day took tea with Mr. and
 his family consists of himself wife three and three sister children
 a young lady companion of the ladies have quite a pleasant time
 This day Feb. 27. 1834 Began with light wind from the SE
 one half the crew on shore employed in calking under fine
 weather but cool

Remarks on Thursday Feb. 28. 1834

Began with fine weather with a fresh breeze from the NW
 employed in calking half of the crew on shore on liberty under fine

Saturday March 1. 1834 Remarks.

Commenced with fresh breeze from the NW and fine weather
 the crew on liberty employed in calking the ship under fine weather.

Remarks on Sunday March 2. 1834

Began with strong winds from the land and fine clear weather
 at 10 AM strong gusts from the Mountains with clouds of dust & rain.
 advised the ship to put her anchor to go the SE anchor. this day attended
 church in the Seamen's Chapel. it seemed good to me to go to the house of -
 we have heard his words preached. under with Capt. H. H. including reports
 Honolulu who has his wife here she appears to be an amiable woman.

Remarks on Monday March 3. 1834.

Commenced with fresh breeze from the Mountains under fine
 moderate at day light took up the SE anchor employed in
 calking & painting. my feet still continue swollen and very lame except

Remarks on Tuesday March 4. 1834.

Commenced with light wind from the land and fine weather with
 employed in painting the pews and pictures & other work on the
 light breeze from the ocean one half of the crew on liberty under fine

Remarks on Wednesday 5. of March 1834.

Commenced with light calm weather employed in calking. weather
 fine pleasant weather. one half of the crew on shore on liberty

Remarks on Thursday March 6. 1834

Began with dark cloudy weather with rain from the land and
 light breeze employed in painting jobs of ship and other work on the

Remarks on Friday March 7. 1834

Commenced with light wind from the land employed in calking
 at 5 PM finished employed in painting under fine weather slight rain

Remarks on Saturday Feb. 8. 1834

Began continued under with light winds from the land
 half of the crew on liberty the other was employed in painting.
