

Remarks on Board Thursday 7th July 1834

Commenced with strong wind from the N by E and a rough sea at 1 PM spoke the Ship Bartholomew Gopola Capt. Payer came on board and took tea with me. Mildew Port strong wind with a high sea on at 1 PM rode ship to the S by E. Lat in on the former Latitude by Merc. Obs 24° 50' N Long by Lunar Obs 174° 15' East.

Remarks on Box & Friday July 11th 1832

Commenced with strong breeze from the N.W. with a high sea running Ship under short sail to P.M. took in the fore top S. wore ship to the North E. S. gradually with rain. Middle Port strong wind and rough to 6 or 7 to the fore top. S. Latter Port strong wind employed towing down six Land Oc. 29. 16 "N."

Remarks on Board Saturday July 12th 1832

Commences with strong winds and squalls. E. & P. H. finished
blowing down all took in the fore top. B. M. & P. H. Port floor.
gates and beams, squalls took in the fore pile ship heading
B. B. Latten Port fresh gates with a high per on at Minicou
to the fore pile over the way E. & P. H. 25. 1/2 N.

Remarks on Board Sunday July 13th 1824

Commenced with strong winds from the N.E. and clear weather
Ship under Mr. L. R. and T. G. guide Mendocino Point more moderate
to 6.9 M. ft. deep water from top 8.5 under Nags to L. L. Point farrelly
employed and returned on the Sabbath Lattit. $40^{\circ} 28' 31''$ N Long $174^{\circ} 10'$.

Remarks on Monday July 12th 1824

Begins with moderate breeze from the ENE and gradually at 7 PM
 took in fore and M^y top S^e gradually with some rain Middle Port
 fine weather wind N by E at 6 PM made sail this morning &
 entered the harbor S^e for repairs. Later part fine weather took
 employed in repairing M^y top S^e Latt by 6.25. N. then got in cabin
 The 11th July 1854 Begins with light rain from the NE at
 fine weather at 6 PM went ship to the North. Virginia Port light
 rain inclining to calm Later Port high wind and rain
 at 4 PM got off him and more

Remarks on Board Wednesday July 16th 1832

Common with calm warm weather. People employed in various
sort of ships, duties at 10 PM took a light breeze from NNE ship under
a fair Moon. No light breeze and fine clear weather. Later
No light air inclining to calm. Lat. 28. 51 N. Long. 175. 51 E.

Remarks on Bird Thrushery July 17th 1852

Commences with light breeze from the ENE and fine clear weather -
Ship under all sail in the two locks to North. Middle of light air
inclining to calm clear weather and very smooth water. Not
much like the former Late Oct. 25-22 & thermometer 8. in cabin
no fish & the perplexity of a whaling voyage when no whales -

Unworked on Board Triton July 18th 1834

Begin with light breezes from S.E. and fine clear weather with a
smooth glass. Ship under all sail with 500 lbs on board to N.E.
Middle Point light winds and fine pleasant weather at 7 A.M. again
better Port squally with rain took in top 90° and flying fire
a strong fair to windward of us steering S.W. N. W. then S.E. in the

Remarks on Board Saturday July 17th 1834

Commenced with fresh breezes on 22^d & 23^d of July weather - 22^d W. to N. E. to
23^d squally with rain at 6 P.M. perceived the frigate port to be near
the 1st look standing for us at 8 P.M. spoke the ship. North Zymocor Capt
Bret. put 2 eyes in the top & look in the M^o 8^o over room ship to North
the main Port flying ensign on & some cloudy at 12 M the flag was
in the berth. Latter Port five breezes from the 2^d N. E. ship under a
sail to the North^o with a smooth sea Capt. Ord. 30^o 23^o N then 90^o in Cabin.

Observations on Bora Sunday July 20th 1834

begin with moderate breezes from the N.W. and fine weather with a
few flying clouds. Ship under all sail to North with a fine smooth sea.
At 1 P.M. took in main sail & 1/2 and spanker and put two reefs in the
top sails fresh breezes and some squally clouds Port flying away
and some flying clouds at 5 P.M. to the west out of the top sails at 10 P.M.
1/2 and spanker with fore and M: top G's and flying Gib Lallan
Port fresh breezes with some flying clouds took in flying Gib &
M: top G's this day employed in reading the holy scriptures and
the Purges of the Church and meditating on the goodness of God to
his sinfull mortals of the earth Oh God what is man thou thinkest not
unwilling of him or the joy of man thou thou hast taken him to do 31: 26 N
