

Remarks on Board Sloop at August 3. 1834
Commenced with fresh breeze and squally with light rain wind
from the E.S. at 2 P.M. took in fore & 8:00 a flying Gilt. Sloop.
hearing S.E. on the 11th track. at 6 P.M. trilled under the top.
at 10 P.M. fresh breeze and squally with showers again at 10
at 11 P.M. took in fore and 11:00 P.M. heavy rain with squalls of wind
Latter Part very rain. This day employed as usual, viz the
sabbath in reading and meditating. Lat. 10 N. Lon. 80°.

Remarks on Board Monday August 2^d 1832
Commenced with moderate wind, from the S.W. with heavy rain
at 2 P.M. clearing up for some time. Doubled again at 6 P.M. took in
the 2^d top. S^d generally rainy weather. Thirde Port moderate wind
and generally at 6 A.M. got from top S^d thick generally weather with
rains. At 10 A.M. saw sperm whales between the Boats the 3^d Boat
proceeded in pulling at 6 o'clock which makes her 25 whales and 400
lbs of Oil. Latter Port generally with frequent showers of rain took
off from the Ship with the whale at 10 A.M. 25.46' N. then 80.

Remarks on Board Sloop, August 15th 1824
Commenced with moderate wind from E.S.E. with showers of
rain at 2 P.M. got the ship to the shore and took it along side where
a monster of the deep about 60 feet long, being sent Phoebe comes
over to try by him for the weight took in the fore hold and deep
under the M^o Mian. Port in several pieces and fine weather at 3 P.M.
commenced cutting in the whale paying with showers of rain at
ship in sight standing to S.W. Lutter Port moderate breeze and
favorably at 4 P.M. got in the harbor and junks Lutter 29.23 N the 40

Remarks on Board the Washington August 2nd 1834
Commenced with light breeze from the S.W. and fine weather
at 2 P.M. took in the Cape Purple employed in clearing out
and getting ready for boiling at 6 P.M. put the water on fire began
to boil then on the S.W. took to N.E. at 10 P.M. more ship to the N.E.
clear weather Middle Port moderate rain and fine clear
weather at 6 P.M. put single reef on fore top st. at 8 P.M. re-
finished boiling here - commenced on the board all hands
busily employed in cutting up and larding the blubber and
other jobs Latter pleased ship in sight to South East 29.00 N.

Remarks on Board Thursday, August 7th 1834
Commenced with trade wind, from the S.E. and fine weather
employed in sailing ship in sight to the Cape at 6 P.M. doubled Cape
the top 5th took in 9 1/2 at 8 P.M. heavy shower of rain with but little
wind and variable from Elyd to S.W. Middle Port moderate wind
and clear. At 6 A.M. moved ship to the Elyd let one reef out of the top 8th at
2 P.M. finished boiling and turned up 80 bbl. of oil Bottom Port light
wind and fine weather employed in clearing the deck. Lat 25. 29 N
Long 177. 20 E

Remarks on Board Friday Augustth 1834 Longitude 171° 20' E
Begin with light rain from the S.S. with light squalls. on a
heavy swell from the S.S. ship on the N.W. tack heading S.W. by S. and
single reef a top S^W etc. At P.M. doubled reef a the top S^W took in 9 ft
from base and M^Y top S^W. Purple haze seen or employed in breaking out
Now down old Middle Port moderate breeze only fine weather
At 4 P.M. let the reef out of the top S^W for M^Y top S^W. Latter Port light rain
and fine fair prevail breezes but none strong Lat by Obsⁿ 29° 26'.

Remarks on Board Saturday August 9th 1834
Begin light rain from the ESE and a fine clear weather all hands
busily employed in getting down oil. At 6 PM double up for the top 8th
work in top 3rd under the top 8th. Middle Part lights winders and ploughs
At 6 AM out rope for 4th hauler and a Mr top 4th watch employed in
getting down oil Mr top 11 finishes flour down 37 lbs. Latter Part
weather clear and pleasant with smooth sea. Latd 06 27' Lon 80.2'

Remarks on Board Sunday August 10th 1834

Commences with light winds from the S.E. and fine pleasant weather
At 6 P.M. double reefed the top sail took in six spinnaker under M^y-top S^e. wind
inclining to South. Middle Port merrily brings on a fine weather. wind
at 11 A.M. the boat out all ways for M^y-top S^e. Six spinnaker under M^y-top S^e. fine
breeze from S.W. the 7 & 11 p Main S^e. Bottom Port fresh breeze and some flying
clouds ship heading N by E to S by E. This day employed as usual on the
labours in preaching and meditating on the goodness of God to us -
from miserable worms of the dust. Lott. G. 28. vs. 11 Thru. at 8 o'clock
this day I have thought much of home and my dear friends and
my dear children. of whom I have not heard since I left them now nearly
two years ago. I rejoice in God as though present and guide them keep them
in heavenly Father's care in the broken of thy house and permit us once more
to meet in this world.
