

Tuesday June 20th

Cornes in with a fresh breeze from S steering to by S the and the Alice Frazier in company. L.P. saw a great many Humpbacks employed scrapping and drying bone Lat 56.22 N

Wednesday June 21st

Cornes in with a fresh breeze from S.S.E. at 4 P.M. the wriggle hauled S.S.E. steered S the and the Splendid in sight saw three other sails on P at 1 o'clock A.M. saw the ice were ship and lay aback. L.P. strong breeze and cloudy at 8 o'clock thick fog. Conds with fair weather saw the Alice Frazier Lat 55.56 N Long 141.15

Thursday June 22^d

Cornes in with a strong breeze from S.E. and clear steering through the ice saw the Alice Frazier pick up a dead whale at 6 P.M. the ship struck a large cake of ice which stopped her headway and started the copper and sheathed off of the cutwater on and L.P. thick fog the ship in the ice

Friday June 23^d

Cornes in with thick fog and a moderate breeze from N.N.W. at 3 P.M. cleared up saw the land bearing from N to S per compass. the ship in the ice saw two sails at 4 P.M. lowered for a whale without success at 8 P.M. came up a thick fog cleared down and hauled the head gear aback on P foggy L.P. at 9 A.M. cleared up made sail and headed N though the ice the Ishantar Islands in sight saw a Bark Lat 55.14 Long 141.15

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Saturday June 24

Cornes in with a moderate breeze from N to S.W. and fine weather headed in for the land. the ice more scattered and not so heavy as here before saw 29 sails lowered for a bowhead without success on and L.P. the ship encompassed with ice with occasional clear spaces passed the Gallao cutting 12 whales this season saw the ship sea and North Star to windward Lat 54.35 N

Sunday June 25th

Cornes in with light airs and fine weather beating through a clear space in the ice the North Star Bark S.H. Waterman Fanny Eugenie and a French ship in disguise with General Washington of New Bedford on her stern at 6 o'clock calm the ship became unmanageable and drifted into the ice in spite of all our efforts to prevent her some of the cakes were nearly half an acre in extent took in sail and let her drift till 2 o'clock when we took a breeze from E and sail and steered to the land through the ice saw a boat lying by a whale belonging to the Sibak Swift the ship at anchor to leeward at 10 A.M. while I was below writing the ship struck a piece of the wall of a proper look out and knocked a large piece out of her cutwater. stood in for the Great Hunter Island

Monday June 26th

Cornes in calm the ship in the ice saw the Reindeer Cromwell 6 whales L.P. sent two boats off to go ashore but did not succeed on account of packed ice
