Remarks on Log of Cape Horn Ship

Tuesday May 20th

First part commences with moderate breeze and pleasant weather from S. steering NW. scraped the masts. Middle part moderate. Latter part the same. washed ship outside.

Wednesday May 21st

First part commences with moderate breeze and fine weather. washed ship inside. Middle part moderate. Latter part moderate. employed in painting ship inside.

Thursday May 22nd

First part commences with moderate breeze and clear weather from NW steering NW. employed in painting ship inside. Middle part moderate breeze. Latter part light breeze with some rain.

Friday May 23rd

First part commences with moderate breeze from NW. backed ship to the W. Middle part moderate breeze. Latter part moderate employed in painting ship outside.

Saturday May 24th

First part commences with light breeze and pleasant weather from N heading NW. finished painting outside. Middle part light breeze. Latter part the same.

Homeward Bound

Sunday May 25th

First part commences with light breeze and pleasant weather from NE steering NW. Middle part calm. Latter part about calm.

Monday May 26th

First part commences with light air steering NW. Middle part calm. Latter part the same employed in filling casks in the hold with salt water.

Tuesday May 27th

First part commences with light breeze and pleasant weather from NW steering NW. Middle part moderate breeze. Latter part fresh.

Wednesday May 28th

First part commences with moderate breeze and pleasant weather from NW steering NW. 1 sail in sight. Middle part fresh breeze. Latter part fresh.

Thursday May 29th

First part commences with fresh breeze and cloudy weather steering NW by N wind NW. saw a Schooner and Bark. Middle part fresh breeze. Latter part fresh breeze from NE heading NW.

Friday May 30th

First part commences with fresh breeze and cloudy weather from NE heading NW. at 3 PM a Steamer spoke us. her name was Simon Lee of Aberdeen bound to Boston her Log was 12.00 Middle part strong breeze. Latter part strong.
