

Remarks On Board The

November Friday the 29 1844

This day commences with light winds from the Northward & and Eastward hours 3 by 6 Middle and latter part fresh breezes with heavy rain and thunder 13 sails in sight all steering to Southward so end this day

November Sunday the 30 1844

This day commences with calm 12 sails in sight Watch employed in ships duty middle part light winds from the S.E. latter part moderate with showers of rain saw porpoises so end this day

December the 1 1844 Sunday 1

This day commences light winds from the North and Eastward steering by the wind heading S.W. latter part rainy so end this day

Monday December the 2 1844

This day commences with calm with heavy rain and thunder middle part heavy light winds from the Northward hours 3 by 6 7 sails in sight latter part the same Watch employed in fishing flying jib Boom so ends this day

Tuesday December the 3 1844

This day commences light winds from the S.E. 9 sails in sight saw a schooner and showed English Colours and also a brig showed English Colours Watch employed in fishing the fore topmast cross trees and cutting straps so end this day heading S.W. Middle and latter part fresh Breezes

Ship Casander of Providence R. I. is

Wednesday December the 4 1844

This day commences with strong winds from the S.E. steering full and by Watch employed in ships duty like the Whale Ship Pacific of New Bedford 44 days out with 3 small sperm whales 4 sails in sight Middle and latter part the same so end this day

Thursday December the 5 1844

This day commences with strong wind from the S.E. at 4 P.M. Wind shifted to Northward hours 3 with all possible sail latter part heavy shower of rain Watch employed in ships duty so end this 24 hours

Friday December the 6 1844

This day commences with strong breezes from from S by E at 12 A.M. locked ship to the Eastward at 6.30 P.M. took again heading to the S.W. Watch employed in fishing a new boat 3 sails Middle part the same latter part more moderate so ends this day of 24 hours

Saturday December the 7 1844

This day commences with light winds from the S.E. at 6 P.M. locked ship heading S.W. steering full and by 7 sails in sight Watch employed in fishing the fore hatch Middle and latter part the same so end this day of 24 hours

Sunday December the 8 1844

First part of this day commences with strong winds from the S.E. steering by the wind 4 sails in sight at 1 P.M. saw a fin backe middle part cloudy latter part the same so end these 24 hours
