

Remarks on Board of the

Monday July 14th

First part of this day commences with strong winds from N.E. at 5 P.M. toward 8 sail after a right Whale without success 2 sails in sight middle part the same latter part the same sail seen

Tuesday July 15th

First part of this day strong winds from S.E. heading N.E. to E. saw sulphur bottom & many birds. Middle part the same & latter part double reefed the topsail & shot head hatches square of rain so much the day 1 sail in sight

Wednesday July 16th 1845

this day strong winds from the N.E. heading on the wind sulphur bottom in sight saw a right whale after so hurried back the starboard boat did not get near him saw a right whale toward the starboard & got 1 sperm out of him & lost 1 some fog & rain middle part the same & latter part showers of rain so much 1 sail in sight

Thursday July 17th

this day light winds from the N.E. heading N.E. with rain at 7 P.M. toward after a sulphur bottom without success toward after 2 right whales 2 times without success middle part the same 1 sail in sight so much the day

Friday July 18th

this day light wind from the N.E. at 2 P.M. 2 sails in sight some whales in sight but going quick middle part

at 8 P.M. toward after a right whale without success latter part spoke the Ship Bonadick of Providence 25 months old 15 numerous so ends foggy home of the Margaret 2 H 3 Whales

Saturday July 19th

this day light wind toward but it was a sulphur bottom in the air 15 sails in sight 1 whale employed in mending the old sails latter part foggy & wind the day

Sunday July 20th

first part of this day commences with strong winds from S.W. heading by the N.W. at 3 P.M. spoke the Ship Matthew of Sag Harbor 2 whales 3 sails in sight saw 100 birds many fog middle part the same spoke the Ship Gold Hunter of Fall River 20 months old & 5 1/2 barrels at 4 P.M. took in the fore & main topsail & least reefed the main bottom a gale of wind so much the day

Monday July 21st 1845

this day commences with strong gales from the N.E. at 2 P.M. set the topsail & at day light set the fore & main topsail & began to sail 1 whale employed in sending up the foretopgallant toward the S.B. the W.B. after sulphur bottom 1 stood up twice but he settled & went down middle part thick fog latter part noar ship to Southard Sound
