 squall from N.W. to S.W. finished sheets
 saw two sail and one fishback

 All day moderate breeze and over-
 cast weather made all sail saw fin-
 back porpoise & grampuse sat up
 mizen stay & etc

Lat 37.16 S Long 86.08 W

Saturday March 14th
 Fin breeze from N.W. course E by N
 & N made all sail saw nothing

Lat 37.15 S Long 83.55 W

Sunday March 15th
 Squally wind shifted from N.W. to S.W.
 took in light sails and sat them again
 had considerable rain tore our studds-
 ing sail repaired it and sat it again
 saw nothing to remark

Lat 37.19 S Long 80.06 W

Monday March 16th
 Moderate & pleasant got two black-
 fish one to waist & one to starboard boats
 scraped the mast & etc

Lat 37.03 S Long 77.42 W

Tuesday March 17th 1857
 All day moderate breeze from N.W. to
 N by W & N course E. & E made all sail
 boiled out our blackish saw porpoise
 & fishbacks Lat 36.51 S Long 74.26 W

Wednesday March 17th
 All day foggy calm weather made the
 land at daylight and at night luffed
 too black headed to W & W wind S. in
 Co. with another whale Bark saw a
 right whale close to the ship lowered two
 boats without success so ended

 Anchored in Tulcahuano 3 fathoms water 25 fms
 chain 18 or 20 ships & Barks in port

 Put 3035 gallons (19 casks) spoil on board
 Bark J. A. Parker of New Bedford for home
 pleasant weather Tulcahuano

Saturday March 21st
 put all our oil on board Bark J. A. Parker
 6555 galls Tulcahuano

Sunday March 22nd
 One watch ashore each a haft a day
 5 Stopped over Mr. Bingham Cooper Isaac
 Blunt (boatstewer) & two first mate hands
 they got in Calaboose the others returned
 Monday morning at
