

Park Gatherwood in the Northern Edge of the Gulf
 Thursday August 29th 1850
 Commences with
 fine weather & a light breeze from N^W & 1
 leading from N^W to N^E (first & middle part)
 latter part hauling to N^E Eastward
 heading from N^W to N^E (Ends Steering
 N^E) Set Stuking sails fine weather
 & wind from N^E.
 Lat 38° 33' Long 69° 35' W

Friday 30th
 Commence with fine
 weather & a light breeze from N^E
 (Water turning Greenish) Middle part the same
 latter part wind out from the Eastward, fine weather
 & North to fine a wind Steering N^W by N. found the current
 setting strong to Southward & Westward, saw four or 5
 sail. Lat 39° 17' Long 70° 42' West

Saturday 31st
 Commences with a light
 breeze from the Eastward at 2 P.M. Boarded
 a Dutch Brig 4 days from New York. Borne
 to — got a little good tobacco. Coming
 back from the Brig got 2 small Black fish.
 (I wish 4 hours more I hope to get where a Black fish
 never spouts) 4 or 5 sail in sight Middle part
 fine weather & light air from South Steering South
 latter part fresh breeze from the Southward
 saw 1 New York Pilot Boat & 10 or 12 sail
 at Vence (at 4 A.M. sounded 90 Fathoms
 20 fms. Lat 40° 40' N Long 71° 05' W

Park Gatherwood
 On the winding up scene
 Sunday September 1st 1850
 Commences with a fine
 breeze from the Southward Steering S^W by S until 4 am
 when we made Long Black Island of Starke's Bow
 bearing N^W by N per compass, hauled up first
 stored mast until 9 in the evening, took in light sails
 & hauled up courses & luffed to the wind with head
 yards aback, heading to Eastward at daylight
 5 am. Black Island bearing N^W by N 5 miles
 Made all sail & Steered S^E by E.
 (Bound to West Port (Mont. God)
 at 10 o'clock AM, passed the
 Apphar out side of the
 Harbor, waiting for a tide
 (I may it roughly from
 Her R. The
