

368 *Bank* *Waterwood of Marigascar*
Wednesday April 18th 1844

All this day water the same
at Port. Lat 30° Long 51° 20'

369 Thursday 19th All these 24 hours
the same as usual heading to 18° E
Lat 30° 10' Long 51° 20'

370 Friday 20th All this day light air

371 Saturday 21st Light air & calm
Lat 32° 08' Long 51° 26'

372 Sunday 22nd All first part calm
middle part strong breeze from South
steering 18° E for St Mary's Middle
& latter part the same steering from
18° E to North Lat 31° 15' Long

373 Monday 23rd All these 24 hours
strong breeze from South steering from
North to 18° E Lat 30° 51' Long 50° 46'

374 Tuesday 24th Strong breeze from
South first part steering 18° E
middle part have too much short sail
with main yard aback at daylight kept
off & made sail steering 18° E
All latter part with the land a part of
Marigascar, Esau's running down
the land for St Mary's & heavy squalls

375 *St Mary's Island*
Wednesday April 25th 1844

Calm here with thick squally
weather. At 3 P.M. Made St. M.
At sunset came to anchor in a
small bay of the land to windward
of the harbour. Middle part at
Anchor. Latter part 2 o'clock
& went to the harbour anchor at 10
in the forenoon. Ends at anchor
(Patience water)

Arrived at St Mary's April 25th & sailed
Monday May 6th making 11 days in
port & had 5 days liberty each watch
got 200 lbs Water Wood & 1000 Barrels
George Washington of New Bedford arrived
April 26 & sailed May 5th Ship
Mexican (and worth) Left 8 days
before we arrived & returned April
27th Captain Dick with the *Heaven*
sailed again May 5th Captain better
& 4 men down with *Plaver*

387 Sunday May 6th All latter part
got under way with the wind 18° E
ends with fine weather heading
to 18° E

388 Monday 7th All these 24 hours fine
weather & light air from the East
Ship on opposite tack
