All these 24 hours Gale Gale
 Gale from the East & S.E. Ship under close reef M. D.
 sail, heading from South to N.E. on what they call
 Port Loughlin. Ground, with a horrid Sea that does not mix.

Lat 27.50. S Long 48.40 East.
 Thursday 18th
 All these 24 hours Gale Gale
 from East heading to S.E. Latter part saw a ship
 steering W. & S. Latter part got the fore sail on her
 Lat Long

Friday 19th
 Gale Moderating. wore ship
 to the North. Middle part wore to S.E. got double reef
 fore sail out. Wind E.S.E. Lat 28.50. S Long 47.28. East

Saturday 20th
 All these 24 hours the wind E.S.E.
 Bark heading to North where they saw a heavy swell heaving
 to the Westward. (repaired the sprayers)

Sunday 21st
 All these 24 hours smart wind & heavy sea
 all from the old quarter Eastward; Catherwood heading from N.E.
 to N.W. & N. all sail set, one more. Lat 26.15. S Long 48.18

Monday 22nd
 The first part of this day fine weather
 saw a sail heading in for the Lanes. At sunset shortened
 sail. At what they call Port Loughlin Middle part
 wind increasing. Latter part blowing a Gale from
 E.S.E.

Tuesday 23rd
 All these 24 hours blowing
 a heavy Gale from the East

Wednesday 24th
 All these 24 hours
 blowing heavy from the East first part heavy squalls
 of rain Latter part strong Gale with a horrid Sea.

Bark Catherwood Indian Ocean
 285 Thursday Jan^y 25th 1849

These 24 hours commenced with a Gale from the East
 blowing heavy. Oh how I wish I could be at home to
 day I think I should be happy, but gods will be done.
 not mine. At 6 P.M. blowing a perfect ^{with rain} Hurricane
 when the wind headed to N. Ship came up from
 N.E. to E. to East, when the rain stopped & Gale moderated
 & left a horrid sea. Middle part weather better & the
 Sea going down. Latter part weather all sail
 set one more. Lat Long

Friday 26th
 This day commenced with
 fine weather & the Wind from the S.W. steering S.E. & E.
 At sunset (Port Loughlin) clouds a rising all threw the
 with rain squalls but not much wind Latter part
 weather fine all sail steering S.E. a trying to get
 out of this place. Lat 26.12 Long 47.52 East

Saturday 27th
 These 24 hours commenced
 with fine weather & light air from the Westward steering
 to S.W. & E. At latter part spoke the ship Leonidas
 of Fairhaven 22nd Dec^r out 1400 lbs. Sp. These 24 hours ended
 hammering with the S. Lat 25.12 Long 50.15

Sunday 28th
 These 24 hours commenced with fine
 weather & light air from the West. Hammering with the
 Leonidas. At sunset shortened sail heading to
 S.W. At 2 off Starboard hear Latter part steering
 to S.W. & E. in company with the ship. first saw a
 small French Thermophrate Brig steering to
 the S. Lat Long
