cruising. Wednesday November 1st. 1848.

Wednesday 1st
Where 24 hours calm
with strong wind from the Eastward employed
repairing old sails. Ship Sharon off our weather
beam heading E. Lat 18° 30' Long

Thursday 2^d
All these 24 hours smart
breezes from the Eastward. Heading to
Southward. At first part gamut with the
Sharon. Middle & latter part strong breezes & calm

Friday 3rd
At first part gamut with the
Sharon. Middle part strong wind heading to S. E.
At latter part saw Hump Backs. Ship L. H.
of our Lee. Lat 18° 10' Long

Saturday 4th
All these 24 hours strong
winds and heavy sea. weather heading to S. E.
the Sharon in sight Lat Long

Sunday 5th
At first part gamut with the
Sharon. Middle & latter part strong breezes from the
Southward & Eastward heading to S. E.
Lat Long

The Bark Catherwood. South Atlantic
203. cruising Monday November 6th 1848

All these 24 hours fine
weather saw nothing. Steering to S. E.
Lat Long

Tuesday 7th
Where 24 hours smart breezes
and fine weather. At latter part 7 AM saw a sperm
Whale. Toward all three boats but without success
going quite to windward the Brig. parition of
Edgar Tann to the windward. Toward but could not
convict. Gamut with the Brig
Lat 18° 16' Long 31

Wednesday 8th
All these 24 hours blowing
fresh saw nothing Lat Long

Thursday 9th
At first part of this day
spoke the Ship Edison 3 months from
New Bedford nothing. At middle part
saw a Merchant Bark. Steering S. by W.
latter part, smart breezes and fine weather
for the time. Lat Long

Friday 10th
All these 24 hours smart
breezes and fine weather. on opposite sides
Lat Long

Saturday 11th
Where 24 hours fine weather
saw a plenty of Hump Back Whales
(they will never bite Mary a wreck.)
Lat 18° 40' Long
