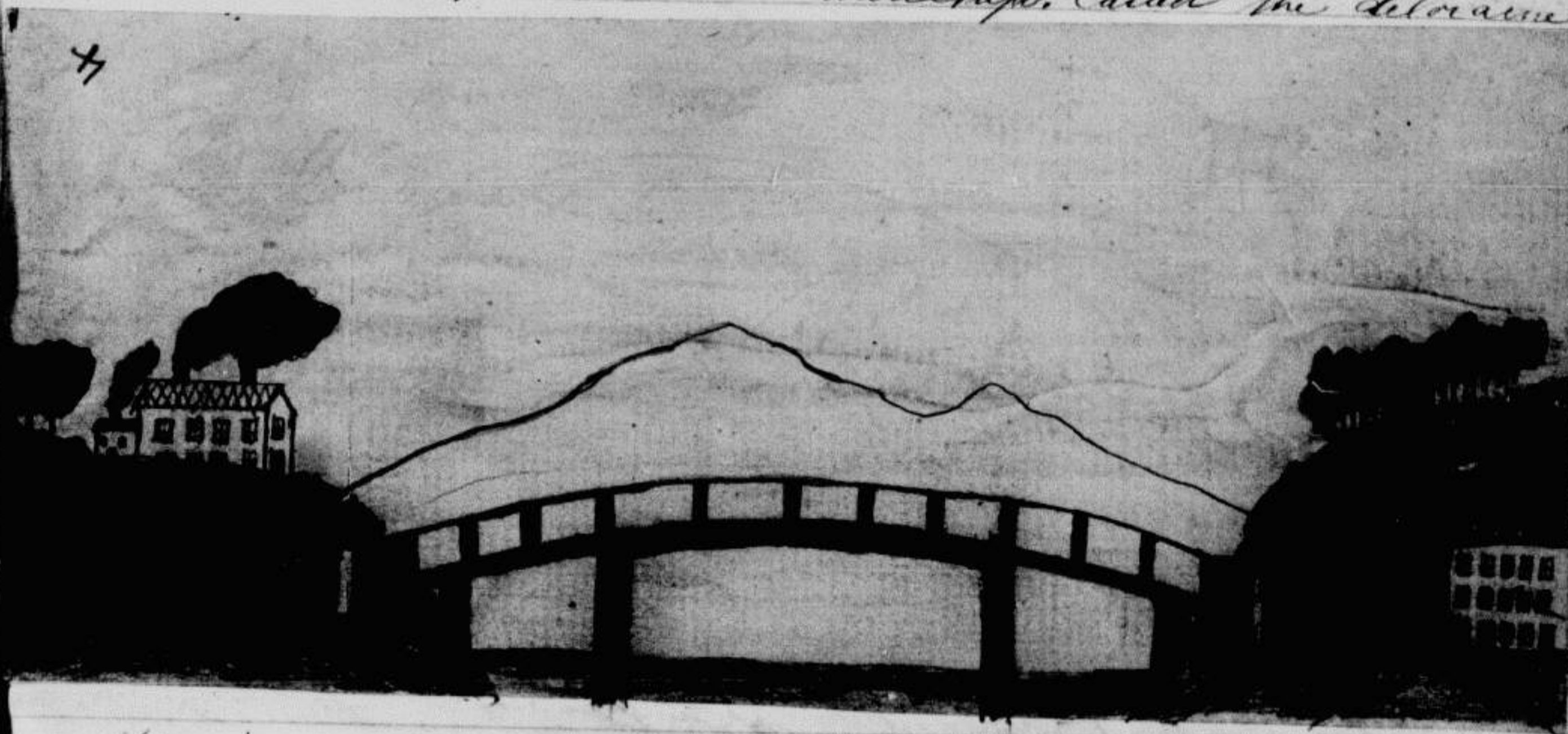

At in the morning before I came away. having come only 14 miles the 23rd of October I thought I must try and do better on the 24th of October which was Monday I passed through Cross wood over the bridge into Catlands Town ship. having come a distance of 23 miles. I stopped over night at Catlands, starting early on the 25th of October through Ross. Town ship into Deloraine township
