 From Hilo to Honolulu Sandwich Is.
 Friday October 21st 64

this day commenced with fine weather, the latter part settling of the oil which we had on board, no rain, rather fine weather for Hilo

Saturday October 22nd 64
 this day commenced with fine weather, with heavy showers of rain, several shifts of wind arrived here since we left our anchors, the fore part got of a small shift of wind

Sunday October 23rd 64
 commenced with fine weather, all hands at taking a run, with the exception of of two men forward & an officer, so do I took dinner supper of Mr. Lyman

Monday October 24th 64
 commenced fine, ship at sea sea, at 11:30 P.M. here of and went to sea, at 6 P.M. I gave the ship Arnold the whole the day, latter part moderate

Tuesday October 25th 64
 commenced moderate all sail set the fore part from N.W. to W. S.W. the latter part at 11 P.M. took in the light sail

Wednesday October 26th 64
 commenced fresh running under full sail, raised Wake about 10 A.M. left to of Dim head at 5 P.M. and back up the trail took the Pilot about 1:30. kept on and somewhat about 10 in the harbor of Honolulu I received one letter from Mr. M.B. H.

Thursday October 27th 64
 pleasant day, took a small passage the fore part out some, to find a spot during the evening I visited Mr. Brown's family

Friday October 28th 64
 fine weather, nothing of notice, at night called on Mrs. Brown

Saturday October 29th 64
 hauled the ship along side of the Adeline & all ready to discharge

Sunday October 30th 64
 fine weather, went to church

Honolulu I November 1st 64

While being in Port we had fine weather and I enjoyed the view if I may use the expression much, the wind along side of the Adeline (Capt. I discharged a little short of six hundred barrels of oil, the ship on board by the Capt. M.B. and the rest of the oil we shifted by the Ship I had brought of about 550 barrels.

While being in port I received but a few lines from home, but I have sent 18 letters from since I sailed from the Adeline, while in Port I received several letters & names somewhat revived in my mind, but I met with several shipmates & friends among them was Benj. F. H. of N. Palmyra, it was a happy meeting indeed, among the latter was Mr. Winslow of Ship Adeline, Mr. John B. H. of Palmyra,

left Honolulu with twenty three men forward five at the fore, Carpenter Stewart & back two boys five at the stern, Captain H. & two children

Honolulu I November 2nd 64
 this day commenced with a light southerly wind, took the Pilot of the Steamer took us to sea, during the latter part the we worked back toward Diamond head at 6 A.M. took the boat anchor and stowed the chains, several ships went to sea the same day as did, Pacific's Euphrates

Friday November 3rd 64
 this day commenced with light southerly winds at 5 P.M. the Capt. I finally came aboard, made all sail working of star middle part working up to the 6 astern of Wake, latter part, light winds from the S.W.

Saturday November 4th 64
 this day commenced with a light breeze from the S.W. all sail set, steering N.E. in ship duty, & getting a new fore reef, at 8 A.M. took in the logan sails, employed the latter part repairing one old topsail that Long

Sailed from Hilo 10:30 P.M.

Arrived at Honolulu 10:30 P.M.
